

GOSPEL MEDITATION



In my parents' bedroom there were on the wall two photos of my mom and dad from their early adulthoods. The photo of my mother entranced me when I was a boy. I loved looking at it, even though I saw her in daily life. Something about that picture captured her perfectly. It was an image of the joy, wisdom, beauty, and strength that enveloped me from the start of my life. It was an icon of the woman who fed, taught, and encouraged me. I felt a deep pride that I came from such beauty.

The beatitudes of Jesus are a kind of self-portrait. But it is a strange picture. At first, the blessings of being poor, mourning, and hungering and thirsting for righteousness may seem bizarre or, worse, a religious delusion. Who wants to look like that? But if we look again, we begin to see the characteristics of Jesus' form. He becomes poor and fills it with his riches for us, he weeps and mourns for us, and fills it with his riches for us, he weeps and mourns for us, and fills it with his joy, he hungers and thirsts fro us to be righteous, and so satisfies us. And so on. It's the way he appears on the cross.

Perhaps we should put on our bedroom room walls the words of the beatitudes next to a crucifix of the Lord Jesus. Then we can do what the beatitudes are designed for, to gaze at the joy, wisdom, beauty, and strength of the one who is our origin, and who is with us every day. And little by little, we'll start to look like him.

An Immigrant-Focused Sunday?





The prophet Zephaniah says in today's first reading, "I will leave as a remnant in your midst a people humble and lowly, who will take refuge in the name of Our God." His reference here is to the Israelites, refugees fleeing slavery in Egypt, but his words also reflect today's immigrant/refugee crisis.

Then Paul's letter to the Corinthians says that "God chose the weak of the world." Who is weaker in power than refugees and immigrants?

We are all familiar with the beatitudes in Matthew's Gospel, but what if we looked at them with a new perspective? Consider the first three beatitudes with an additional word added in capital letters.

"How blest are the poor in spirit REFUGEES; the reign of God is theirs.

Blessed too are the sorrowing IMMIGRANTS; they will be consoled.

Blessed are the lowly MIGRANTS; they will inherit the land."

These additions seem to intensify their meaning for today's world. These same beatitudes call on us to show mercy so mercy can be ours and to rejoice for our reward in heaven is great.

Helping our Immigrant Refugee Ministry at Old St. Patrick's is an indirect way to show mercy to the immigrant/refugee community. 

Are You Struggling with Your Values?

I often meet clients struggling with a similar conundrum. In therapy, it's very common to hear folks describe living their life with values that feel at odds with the way they are living. For many, these values at one point made sense and even provided relief when they were achieved. And why is that? Put simply, we rely on our values. But as life changes so too do our beliefs about what is important for us, and why.

When our values change it can be really jarring. Our values play a major role in how we see ourselves personally, in relation to Spirit, socially, and as members of society as a whole. When we feel we are no longer or are unable to continue living up to our values we can experience feelings such as anxiety, depression, anger, guilt, sadness, and shame. It's in these moments where our values are no longer lining up with our current circumstances that we don't just need our values, but our values also need us.

Our values are learned from many sources throughout our lives. Our families, communities, and personal experiences all play a role. In therapy, we can take a look at our values and begin to notice where they may not be serving us anymore. By creating a space to look at what we find personally meaningful in living an authentic life, we will find places where our values clash, and are in need of updating, and perhaps, even replacing.

If you're someone who is finding it challenging to live a values-based life, just know that's common. Values shift across a lifetime just as we do, and require careful reflection and tending to. If these difficulties feel familiar to you, reach out. It is always a good time to get to know our values.

The Future of Zero Waste Cities



The Zero Waste Cities Approach is a continuous effort to phase out waste—not by burning or landfilling it—but instead by creating and implementing systems that do not generate waste in the first place. Zerowastecities.eu



The Zero Waste movement has been around under different names, including "Total Recycling" and "No Waste," since 1995. It began as an effort to convert waste, seen as something undesirable, into an asset that could be resold or redistributed, thereby generating revenue or other value, while at the same time

avoiding the environmental costs of waste disposal. The term "No Waste" morphed into "Zero Waste" at the first Zero Waste Conference in New Zealand in 2005. Since then, the movement has spread around the world, and many cities both large and small have embraced the goal of becoming Zero Waste Cities; that is, becoming cities that transform the many forms of waste into something environmentally useful. Here are some success stories from cities that are embracing the Zero Waste concept around the world.

In 2012, Milan Italy, a city of 1.4 million residents, 80% of whom live in high rises, put into action a plan for reducing food waste, by implementing a separate collection system for food waste. Food waste is now collected multiple times per week in Milan, and then sent to a processing plant. Here it is converted into biogas, which is used to power vehicles; or turned into compost, 20% of which is distributed free of charge to homeowners, and the rest resold to area organic farmers. This system saves 9000 tons of CO2 per year, and also improves recycling of other materials like cans and plastics, because they are less likely to be contaminated by food waste.

Newport in Wales, a city of 141,000, was dissatisfied with its low recycling rate in 2012. It began an extensive campaign of engaging and educating residents about the value of recycling. Over 8 years, the recycling rate increased from 48% to 66%, while waste not being recycled declined from 52% to 38%. The increase in recycling saved residents hundreds in taxes each year, as the city saw lower costs for waste disposal and higher returns from its quality recycling material. In 2020, the city opened two thrift stores where residents could donate clothing, preventing those goods as





well from going to the landfill. Newport continues to analyze ways to reduce its waste stream.



San Francisco California is known as one of the best Zero Waste Cities in the world. The city found success by changing to three separate streams for its trash, and by including financial incentives in its planning. Homeowners and businesses have three carts: 64-gallon blue carts for recycling; 32-gallon green carts for composting; and 16-gallon black carts for landfill. At the beginning, rates for collecting recycling and composting material were lower than for collecting material for landfill, although now rates are comparable. Businesses are rewarded financially for reducing their waste, and penalized for failing to adequately separate waste material. Only 20% of the city's waste now goes to landfill based on this system of multiple waste streams and financial incentives. Like Milan, San Francisco has a huge urban composting operation, and sells its compost to nearby vineyards

and farms as fertilizer. Its Zero Waste policies fuel job growth; 20 jobs are created for each ton of material recycled, versus 1 job for a ton going to the landfill. The city practices sustainability in other ways too. City buses are hybrids or electric vehicles, or powered by biofuels. Residents get free water saving devices like low flow showerheads, and everyone benefits from reduced used of water on landscaping with small urban yards. The result is San Franciscans use 49 gallons of water per day, compared with 100 gallons per day statewide. Clearly San Francisco's world-wide renown as a Zero Waste City is well deserved.

Currently only 34% of Chicago residents recycle. Will multiple stream waste management, large scale urban composting, and city-wide participation in recycling come to the Windy City? Could Chicago join the movement to become a Zero Waste City? We hope so.

Errick Hackler — U-TURN PERMITTED

Errick Hackler is a 2019 U-Turn Permitted program graduate, who faced financial hardship after his job delivering COVID-19 vaccines to hospitals and healthcare clinics ended in June 2022. Mr. Hackler needed assistance paying his rent, and he reached out to his NLEN Client Solution Specialist Sadie Joseph, who referred Mr. Hackler to the NLEN Financial Opportunity Center. FOC Staff secured rental assistance through Old St. Pat's. As a result, Mr. Hackler was able to catch up on his rent, remain in his housing, and continue to work to secure employment. Mr. Hackler is now employed through a temp staffing agency and can pay his bills while seeking permanent employment. Mr. Hackler does not know what would have happened if he had not gotten rental assistance through the Financial Opportunity Center and Old St. Pat's.

Errick Hackler's goal is to obtain his Commercial Driver's License and is working with his NLEN Client Solutions Specialist to secure the funding support for his CDL training. Jobs in Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics are in great demand, as a shortage of qualified drivers is one component of supply chain challenges. Errick wants to get his CDL so he can have a career that will allow him to meet and exceed his long-term financial goals.



Servant of God Brother Juniper

Saint of the Day for January 29, 2023

Servant of God Brother Juniper's Story

"Would to God, my brothers, I had a whole forest of such Junipers," said Francis of this holy friar.

We don't know much about Juniper before he joined the friars in 1210. Francis sent him to establish "places" for the friars in Gualdo Tadino and Viterbo. When Saint Clare was dying, Juniper consoled her. He was devoted to the passion of Jesus and was known for his simplicity.

Several stories about Juniper in the Little Flowers of St. Francis illustrate his exasperating generosity. Once Juniper was taking care of a sick man who had a craving to eat pig's feet. This helpful friar went to a nearby field, captured a pig and cut off one foot, and then served this meal to the sick man. The owner of the pig was furious and immediately went to Juniper's superior. When Juniper saw his mistake, he apologized profusely. He also ended up talking this angry man into donating the rest of the pig to the friars!

Another time Juniper had been commanded to quit giving part of his clothing to the half-naked people he met on the road. Desiring to obey his superior, Juniper once told a man in need that he couldn't give the man his tunic, but he wouldn't prevent the man from taking it either. In time, the friars learned not to leave anything lying around, for Juniper would probably give it away.

He died in 1258 and is buried at Ara Coeli Church in Rome.

Reflection

What can we make of Juniper? He certainly seems to be the first of many Franciscan "characters." No doubt some of the stories about him have improved considerably in the retelling. Although the stories about Juniper may seem a little quaint, his virtues were not. He was humble because he knew the truth about God, himself, and others. He was patient because he was willing to suffer in his following of Jesus.
