

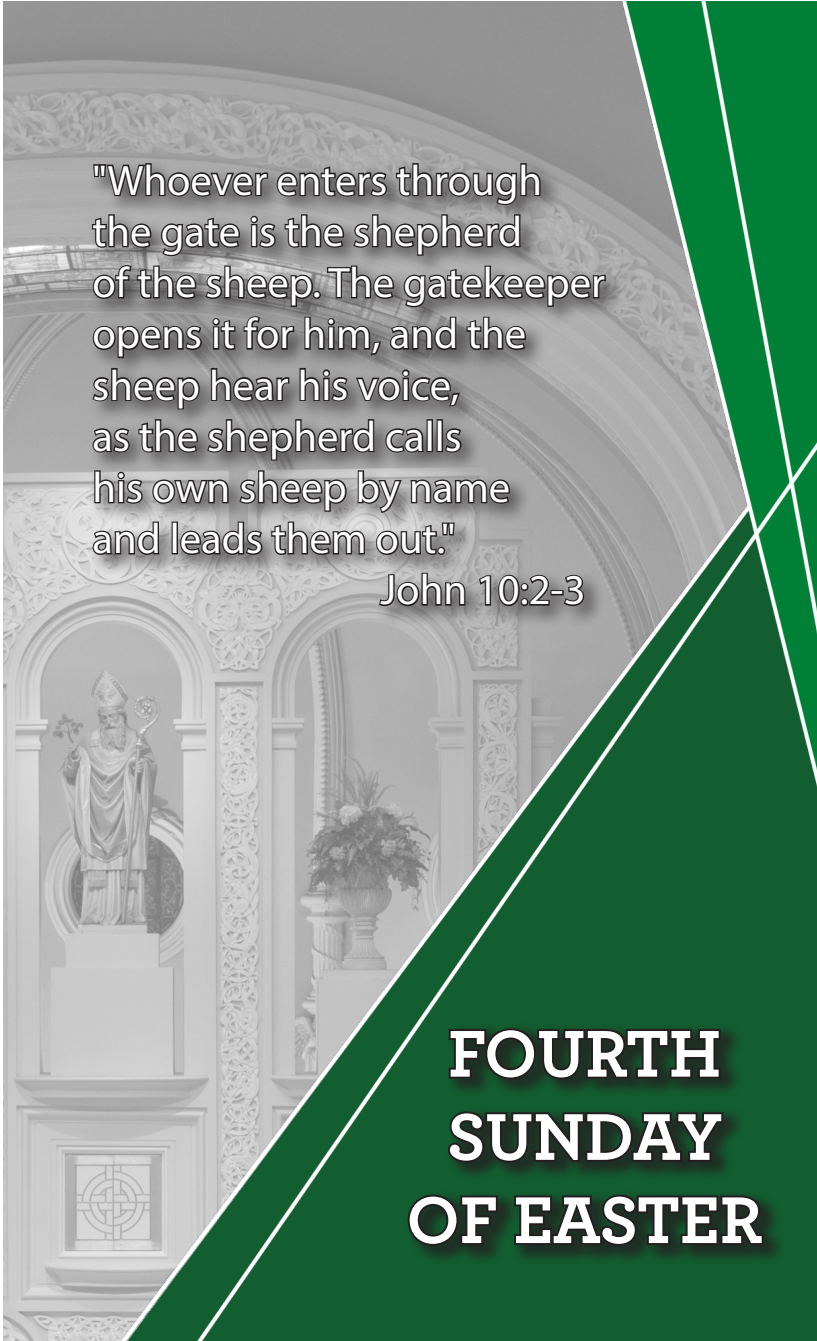

## HOW WE CAN LET JESUS SPEAK THROUGH US AS HE CONTINUES TO CALL NEW SHEEP TO ETERNAL LIFE?

Biblical authors used shepherds as symbols wherever they wanted to emphasize God's protection, God's care, God's generosity or God's leadership. David, for example, was a shepherd before God made him Israel's king (1 Sam 16:11). In Psalm 77:21, meanwhile, God is the shepherd during the Exodus from Egypt, "You led your people like a flock by the hand of Moses and Aaron." This Sunday's responsorial psalm likewise reinforces that image with a description of God as a shepherd who protects and feeds the flock. This Sunday's Gospel reading adds another layer to this rich symbol. Just as the voice of a shepherd rouses and gathers the flock every morning, Jesus' message will bring new life and a new community to those who follow him.

Jesus' main occupation was preaching. This can get lost amid the drama of Gospel miracle stories, but again and again, the evangelists tell us, Jesus "... journeyed from one town and village to another, preaching and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom of God" (Lk 8:1). His voice, even more than his mighty deeds, was the power that transformed hearts and lives.

He must have had a magnetic personality. Whether people loved or hated him, they came to hear him speak. In today's Gospel passage, John symbolizes this personal magnetism with sheep who recognize the master's voice. In ancient times, villagers kept their sheep together in a common sheepfold overnight. Every morning, members of each household would come to the common fold and call out the names of their family's sheep. The animals would recognize the shepherd's voice and follow. John uses this illustration from everyday life to describe the effect Jesus had on his listeners. It was as if, after a long night's sleep, they recognized Jesus' voice and perked up, ready to follow.

This message bore the power of the Spirit. What filled Jesus' disciples with such energy was the sound of the truth as they'd never heard it before. It was, John emphasizes, directly from the mind of God. Moses and the prophets understood only partly the divine love that Jesus knew completely and taught his disciples to treasure. Loving as Jesus did, completely, selflessly, and to the end, filled each disciple with such energy that the only way to describe it was new and eternal life.

We speak with that voice now. The Spirit that gave Jesus' message such power is the inheritance of every baptized Christian. Working together, we continue the Lord's mission to bring every person to eternal life. The challenge in this Sunday's readings is, perhaps, to ask how we can let Jesus speak through us as he continues to call new sheep to eternal life.

CATC and FXW are grateful for our longstanding partnership of more than three decades with Old St. Patrick's Church. The generosity of the OSP members plays an integral role in supporting the hundreds of current students receiving assistance. Over 200 students attending FXW receive some form of tuition assistance, and 100% of the students and faculty benefit from the socio-economic diversity the School has to offer. Your support is an affirmation that you believe, like we do, that we can form the faith of the next generation and send them onward to create an impact in our city, country, and the world.

Attracting students from over 60 zip codes, CATC provides multi-year scholarships for students to attend FXW. In this environment, children experience an exceptional education, rooted in faith, service, diversity and inclusion. Thanks to CATC and FXW, students matriculate to the finest high schools and colleges in the country. Since its inception, CATC has awarded over \$17 million to more than a thousand scholarship recipients.

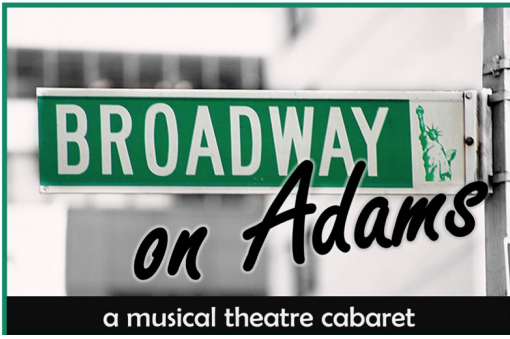

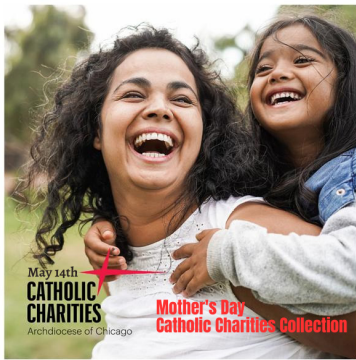

### Who are today's U.S. immigrants?

The U.S. has more immigrants than any other nation in the world. In 2017, there were 44.4 million immigrants in the country, meaning almost one in every seven people living in the U.S. was born in another country and was not a U.S. citizen at birth. These immigrants include both residents with legal status and those in the country illegally.



Mexicans are the largest group, but not among new immigrants.

The U.S. foreign-born population is diverse, representing the majority of the world's countries. But one country—Mexico—stands out. More than 11 million U.S. immigrants were born in Mexico, putting it at the top of birth countries. There are nearly as many immigrants from Mexico as from all of South and East Asia. The next most popular birth nation is China (2.9 million) followed by India (2.6 million). All of the top 10 birth countries are either in Latin America or Asia.

Mexicans had been the largest group among new arrivals to the U.S. over the past three decades, but in recent years that has changed as immigration from Mexico has slowed. Today, India and China send as many immigrants to the U.S. each year as Mexico, reflecting a broader shift away from Latin America and toward Asia among new immigrant arrivals.

Most live in Western and Southern states.

Immigrants tend to be concentrated in certain states and regions. That's partly because immigrants often move near family members or other people from their home countries. Or, they come for employment that is concentrated in certain areas—agriculture or technology jobs, for example. More than 6 in 10 immigrants live in only 20 U.S. metropolitan areas, even as those areas are home to just 37% of the total U.S. population.

California, Texas and New York have the largest immigrant populations, together accounting for 45% of the country's foreign-born residents in 2017. The regions with the most immigrants are the West and the South.

## Saint Pius V

### Saint of the Day for April 30, 2023

This is the pope whose job it was to implement the historic Council of Trent. If we think popes had difficulties in implementing Vatican Council II, Pius V had even greater problems after Trent four centuries earlier.

During his papacy (1566-1572), Pius V was faced with the almost overwhelming responsibility of getting a shattered and scattered Church back on its feet. The family of God had been shaken by corruption, by the Reformation, by the constant threat of Turkish invasion, and by the bloody bickering of the young nation-states. In 1545, a previous pope convened the Council of Trent in an attempt to deal with all these pressing problems. Off and on over 18 years, the Fathers of the Church discussed, condemned, affirmed, and decided upon a course of action. The Council closed in 1563.

Pius V was elected in 1566 and charged with the task of implementing the sweeping reforms called for by the Council. He ordered the founding of seminaries for the proper training of priests. He published a new missal, a new breviary, a new catechism, and established the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine classes for the young. Pius zealously enforced legislation against abuses in the Church. He patiently served the sick and the poor by building hospitals, providing food for the hungry, and giving money customarily used for the papal banquets to poor Roman converts. His decision to keep wearing his Dominican habit led to the custom—to this day—of the pope wearing a white cassock.

In striving to reform both Church and state, Pius encountered vehement opposition from England's Queen Elizabeth and the Roman Emperor Maximilian II. Problems in France and in the Netherlands also hindered Pius's hopes for a Europe united against the Turks. Only at the last minute was he able to organize a fleet which won a decisive victory in the Gulf of Lepanto, off Greece, on October 7, 1571.

Pius' ceaseless papal quest for a renewal of the Church was grounded in his personal life as a Dominican friar. He spent long hours with his God in prayer, fasted rigorously, deprived himself of many customary papal luxuries, and faithfully observed the spirit of the Dominican Rule that he had professed.
