



A MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

"How is it going? How do you like being pastor at St. Pat's?"

Over these past eight months as pastor, many friends and acquaintances have asked these questions. I have to say that I love it. While I have been connected to OSP for many years, I still find myself discovering something new about us nearly every day. The breadth and depth of the life and ministry of this community are extraordinary and deeply consoling. I am enjoying being stretched in new ways and working through the next best steps for us in the days ahead.

Let me share a few observations of life at OSP these days...

- The mission of this community is vibrant and there is deep commitment by large numbers of staff and members to continually recommit to our shared goals.
- Our worship, spiritual ministries, and justice and service programming reach far and wide. We are more than 9,100 registered families representing 916 zip codes. Our livestream Masses and events had more than 155,000 views last year. Our outreach in formation programs, pastoral care and social justice ministries is remarkable.
- While there has been steady growth in the number of folks attending Mass in person as we have put the worst of the pandemic behind us, attendance is still only about 60% of what it was in 2019. I believe we have great opportunities to extend our reach as missionary disciples and continue to build up our Sunday worship community.
- Each Sunday, we have around 2,500-3,000 livestream viewers for Mass. Of those viewers, half live in zip codes outside of the state of Illinois. It is clear that for those who are physically unable to be with us in person, the livestream is a lifeline to our vibrant liturgies. What a blessing it is for our community.
- At times, we seem to operate with assumptions about our community, the desires of our members, our role in the larger church and other important considerations that may no longer be accurate. As an example, I think there have been shifts in demographics in our OSP community in the past 5-7 years. Gathering more reliable data about who we are is a priority moving forward. The Disciple Maker Index survey that we just launched will help us gather some useful information. I encourage you to take the time to share your perspective. Links to the survey can be found on our website.
- I was not part of the process that resulted in the articulation of our current Vision & Mission Statement. It
 is clear that living out of this statement has inspired and challenged the community. Thanks be to God!
 I believe that there is work to be done, however, to discern and articulate a fuller strategic plan for OSP
 that flows from this good work. Working with our leadership team and our Parish Advisory Board, I look
 forward to this important work in the days ahead.

I am excited to lead us in prayerful discernment about how God might be calling us today. I am confident that the spiritual freedom and creativity characteristic of OSP will help us to respond generously to the call!



CALLED TO CHANGE, CONNECTION, AND COMMUNITY

This Lent at Old St. Pat's, we are "**Called to Change, Connection, and Community**"—a focus statement informed by the community around us, by our Vision statement, and by the ecclesiological tenets of the season. In today's gospel, aided by multiple instances of *light* imagery, Matthew's account of the Transfiguration may, in fact, echo that same concept. As we are drawn to the sacred presence of shared community and Eucharist, I will offer a brief reflection on today's music and its relationship to our seasonal focus and the gospel.

Light plays a critical role in the story of Transfiguration, altering the outward appearance of Jesus, illuminating his face, effecting conversion, and even acting as a harbinger for the voice of God. When we sing Bernadette Farrell's *Christ Be Our Light*, may that prayer resound fervently as our call to build community. We sing that Christ's light might shine in our hearts so that we may be light to others.

For offertory, we introduce a new piece by African American composer Roger Holland called *The Encounter*. Holland is a Liturgical Music Consultant for the Archdiocese of New York Office of Black Ministry and Music Director for special masses at St. Patrick's Cathedral. Continuing my commitment to use music of women composers and composers of color at each mass, his music serves as a welcome pathway to changing and enhancing our own repertoire. The verses speak of invitation and shared song, of welcoming *light* and illuminating clarity, while the refrain reminds us of <u>connection</u>, or encounter, with Jesus. We sing—together of course!—of the changes in our lives when we encounter Jesus in each other. Our lives will "never be the same", or as the Spanish translation (which we will sing on March 19th) articulates: *tu vida entera cambiará* (your entire life will *change*). Light, Holland surmises, leads us to connection and change. We are sent forth with Tony Alonso's *I Will Lift My Eyes*, the text of which takes inspiration from 10th century Celtic poetry, Psalm 121, and the writings of Thomas Merton. The first two verses speak beautifully to what I imagine as the outcome of the Transfiguration. It is time to move away from our "shelter of safety" (no tent construction needed), to rise and not be afraid of the storm, to forgive, to follow where Jesus is leading: to listen to God's beloved son. This sense of change and budding discipleship is possible only with God's mercy which we invoke in the psalm, and in our collective response to lift our eyes to the mountains. For it is from there that our help is found, and that light reveals the pathway for us to follow. May we listen courageously to Jesus and be the light that transfigures the world around us.

We are all part of an interwoven liturgical fabric of sacred word, ritual, and art. As we continue to return to the pews, the sights and sounds of liturgy at Old St. Pat's recall a sense of belonging, welcome, and life-giving joy that so many seek. We find our voice by participating in that liturgical experience, by our collective words reverberating off the stenciled walls, and by our music mingling into one voice. I'm honored to help shape the musical experience and encounters of this community.

Archdiocese seeks feedback from parishioners about their faith life

Chicagoland

On Ash Wednesday, Feb. 22, archdiocesan parishes will roll out the Disciple Makers Index Survey to all parishioners with the goal of learning where parishioners are in their faith journeys and how the local church can help them grow in that faith.

People can access the 75-question survey, which organizers say should take 10 to 15 minutes to complete, through a QR code. Paper copies will also be available at parishes. The survey closes on March 31, before the start of Holy Week.

Priests will take a Priests Leadership Inventory Survey at the same time.

"This is an opportunity for us, working with Catholic Leadership Institute, to do a great assessment in our parishes of two things: give parishioners an opportunity to reflect on their own spiritual growth and to provide feedback on the efforts of the parish to help them grow," said James Klein, senior advisor to the archdiocese, who is helping to coordinate the effort.

The Archdiocese of Chicago is part of a pilot project that includes 15 other dioceses across the country. Funding comes from Lilly Endowment Inc.

"It gives us a great opportunity to assess where we're at," Klein said.

"The timing is such that it's very good for us coming out of COVID, coming out of Renew My Church restructuring and how to best move forward in the context of Renew My Church."

Participants can remain anonymous and surveys are available in 19 languages. Parishes will receive results in early June, along with training on how to understand the information, determine next steps and communicate the results to the parish.

"One of the great things about this, it not only gives parishes the opportunity to look at themselves, but it also provides a real benchmarking opportunity versus other parishes," Klein said. "You can cut it by demographic groups within your parish. ... This survey has now been taken by a million Catholics in the United States, so we have a great opportunity to benchmark against others and other parishes."

The Priests Leadership Inventory will help priests and archdiocesan leaders with priest development and formation.

"For our priests, we have four strategies there — ongoing formation and development, more planful priest placement process, hoping priests will develop a growth plan, opportunity for coaching and mentoring," Klein said. "As far as the Disciples Makers Index, as well, it helps each parish have a greater understanding of hearing the voices of their parishioners as we continue to revitalize our parishes." The archdiocese plans to conduct the survey every few years, he said. "It will give us an opportunity over time to see how we are developing our parishes," he said.

Father Ken Simpson, a retired pastor and former vicar for professional and pastoral development of priests, said the information that will be gathered through the priests' survey will benefit the whole archdiocese. "We've always had this desire to develop a good database, a good baseline understanding of just who our priests are and to record that in a way that the priests themselves could contribute to it," said Simpson.

The archdiocese has also wanted a view into how effective parishes are at making disciples. "The archdiocese learned that many other dioceses were thinking of the same thing, and Catholic Leadership Institute, which helped in the discernment and decisions process of Renew My Church, has been working on these very same ideas with a grant from Lilly Endowment Inc.," Simpson said.

Parishes often do surveys, said Simpson, but they can be more surface-level, such as asking people what time they want Mass to be. But the point of the Disciple Makers Index is to learn how people are practicing their faith and how the parish can better support them in developing that relationship with God.

"The real point of Renew My Church is evangelization, is making disciples. So you'll have a baseline and you'll have something to work on. You can make a plan from some data," he said. "And, of course, the archdiocese will have a sense of that too: How many people actually going to church understand the faith, and are acting out of that faith? Speaking as a pastor, I found it immensely helpful to actually have a number, a snapshot of what's actually happening, what are people's attitudes, what are their practices," Simpson said.




process of listening for the Spirit's urgings in and for our church. Members of Discerning Deacons have fostered opportunities to engage with theologians, church leaders, and Catholics around the United States, parts of Mexico, and areas of the Bolivian Amazon - all in order to see where and how women are serving and ministering to God's people in the world today.

Those engaged in this movement seek the intercession of St. Phoebe, who in his letter to the Romans, St. Paul commends to the church in Rome, introducing her as a deacon (diakonos) of the church at Cenchrae. She was a woman of great courage and deep love, answering the call "to minister to God's people in the earliest days of the church, when persecution against Christians was strong. She earned the trust of Paul, who depended on her to handle communications with the ecclesial community in Rome*," surely facing adversity from the patriarchal society of the day.

Since the beginning of Christianity, the good news has been spread and served by women who have answered God's call. As Pope Francis encourages the global church to engage in ongoing synodality, let us amplify the voices of women whose encounters with Christ in their ministry can inform where and how our Church might move forward in this movement.



A Lenten Faith Journey March 5 - March 11, Week 2







Second Sunday of Lent

Saint Dominic Savio

Saint of the Day for March 10, 2023

So many holy persons seem to die young. Among them was Dominic Savio, the patron of choirboys.

Born into a peasant family at Riva, Italy, young Dominic joined Saint John Bosco as a student at the Oratory in Turin at the age of 12. He impressed Don Bosco with his desire to be a priest and to help him in his work with neglected boys. A peacemaker and an organizer, young Dominic founded a group he called the Company of the Immaculate Conception which, besides being devotional, aided John Bosco with the boys and with manual work. All the members save one, Dominic, would, in 1859, join Don Bosco in the beginnings of his Salesian congregation. By that time, Dominic had been called home to heaven.

As a youth, Dominic spent hours rapt in prayer. His raptures he called "my distractions." Even in play, he said that at times, "It seems heaven is opening just above me. I am afraid I may say or do something that will make the other boys laugh." Dominic would say, "I can't do big things. But I want all I do, even the smallest thing, to be for the greater glory of God."

Dominic's health, always frail, led to lung problems and he was sent home to recuperate. As was the custom of the day, he was bled in the thought that this would help, but it only worsened his condition. He died on March 9, 1857, after receiving the Last Sacraments. Saint John Bosco himself wrote the account of his life.

Some thought that Dominic was too young to be considered a saint. Saint Pius X declared that just the opposite was true, and went ahead with his cause. Dominic was canonized in 1954. His liturgical feast is celebrated on March 9.

Like many a youngster, Dominic was painfully aware that he was different from his peers. He tried to keep his piety from his friends lest he have to endure their laughter. Even after his death, his youth marked him as a misfit among the saints and some argued that he was too young to be canonized. Pope Pius X wisely disagreed. For no one is too young—or too old or too anything else—to achieve the holiness to which we all are called.


