



Matthew's Gospel often speaks of fear. In its very first chapter, the angel tells Joseph, "Do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home." Throughout the narrative, Jesus reminds his disciples to replace their anxiety with trust in God, and in the closing episodes, the women who find the tomb empty on Easter depart "fearful, yet overjoyed, running to announce this to his disciples."

Today's Gospel reading comes from the moment when Jesus sends his disciples out to preach and heal on their own. This is their first attempt at ministering without Jesus; they may have been excited, but they are clearly feeling fear. Jesus' ministry had begun to attract hostility, and they feared that theirs would as well, and that they would be all alone to face it.

Jesus reminds them that they have an advocate and protector, the God of heaven and earth. Therefore they ought to fear no one and to preach boldly. These two themes appear throughout early Christian literature. Luke, for example, relates the way that the early church preached the gospel with parrhesia, a word with meanings that include "bold speech," "risky speech," and "speech for the common good." Bold speakers inspired fascination in the ancient world, but in an explosive environment like Roman-occupied Palestine, such fearless speech probably struck the twelve as imprudent more than inspiring. And yet, they were speaking the truth that God wanted the world to hear. For the good of humanity, they had to preach and disregard the consequences.

As the first reading shows, this fearless speech was nothing new in ancient Israel. Jeremiah the prophet, the author of our first reading, aroused such hostility that the King of Israel summoned Jeremiah before the throne and burned a scroll of his prophecies right before his face (Jer 36:20-26). Jeremiah, undeterred, simply produced another scroll. His boast, "the LORD is with me like a mighty champion," was no idle claim. Jeremiah was imprisoned, tortured, and even left to die in a muddy well; he was delivered each time. He never stopped preaching, and history proved his words to be correct.

This is our call as well. The world shows increasing hostility to the values of the Gospel. Generosity, forgiveness, love, and mercy are not the values our economic and political leaders strive to uphold. We can never forget, though, that these are the values God sent Jesus to teach the world. Like the first apostles, we too much speak God's truth and disregard the consequences. When we do, we can share the gift they themselves received, to experience the joy of life in the presence of God for all eternity.



THE RETURN OF THE COMMON CUP

On this Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ, we celebrate and honor the presence of Christ in all forms—especially as we gather through our Eucharistic celebration. We are overjoyed to announce that the Archdiocese of Chicago has lifted the last remaining COVID restrictions and has permitted the Common Cup - the Blood of Christ - to be distributed again at Masses. Indeed, the fullest sign of the Eucharistic Banquet is to eat *and* drink.

Beginning **July 9th** we will once again offer the Blessed Sacrament under *both* species - bread and wine. There will be more information shared as we get closer to July 9th about the logistics of the Cup returning to Mass. In the meantime, we are grateful for your support, presence, and understanding during the time of the pandemic and looking forward to this return.



Why Smart Thermostats are a Sustainable Choice

It is estimated that home thermostats control 9% of the energy consumption in the United States. There is great potential for us to live more lightly on the earth, our common home, by using every tool in our toolkit. This includes ones that reduce the energy used to heat and cool our homes, without sacrificing our everyday comfort. Smart thermostats give us the ability to do just that.

We all know that we are comfortable using less heating and cooling energy when we are away from home, especially for extended travel, or at night when we are less active, tucked under the covers. But we also know that we don't always remember to adjust the thermostat when we go out of town, especially when we are in a rush to get going; or when we go to bed, and are tired from a long day. Programmable thermostats allow us to adjust the temperature at certain times during the day or certain days of the month, without being present in the home. But smart thermostats go several steps further, by being able to learn about our preferences and the home environment, and take appropriate action, independent of our faulty memories and missed intentions.

Smart thermostats detect when our homes are occupied, either by sensing our movement around the home, or by tracking the presence of our cell phones. They know if we worked late, or went to work early, and make the appropriate adjustments. They give us room specific control, and personalized recommendations based on how we could adjust the system in the future in responses to heat and cold. We can monitor and manually adjust the temperature in our homes with such a device from anywhere: a smartphone, computer, laptop, or tablet. Their touch screens are easy to read and program; they suggest settings for us to maximize sustainable energy use. They help us take advantage of peak pricing, reducing our usage during such times. Some models can monitor carbon dioxide and smoke. They can even remind us when it is time to change the filter on the furnace or air conditioner.

Smart thermostats save us money, because less energy use means lower costs. Some studies estimate savings of 10 to 12 percent on heating, and 15 percent on central air-conditioning. Actual savings depend on each person's prior thermostat use, and heating and cooling needs. Many experts agree that the payback period for a smart thermostat is around 2 years. Commonwealth Edison offers rebates of \$75 dollars on many smart thermostats, including the popular Nest model. Your upfront cost can be as low as \$1, and up to \$175, with this rebate.

If it is time to replace your thermostat, or you want have enhanced ability to make energy choices, consider upgrading to a smart thermostat. It's the sustainable thing to do.







Women and Men of Faith

Nativity of Saint John the Baptist Saint of the Day for June 24, 2023

Jesus called John the greatest of all those who had preceded him: "I tell you, among those born of women, no one is greater than John...." But John would have agreed completely with what Jesus added: "[Y]et the least in the kingdom of God is greater than he" (Luke 7:28).

John spent his time in the desert, an ascetic. He began to announce the coming of the Kingdom, and to call everyone to a fundamental reformation of life. His purpose was to prepare the way for Jesus. His baptism, he said, was for repentance. But one would come who would baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire. John was not worthy even to untie his sandals. His attitude toward Jesus was: "He must increase; I must decrease" (John 3:30).

John was humbled to find among the crowd of sinners who came to be baptized the one whom he already knew to be the Messiah. "I need to be baptized by you" (Matthew 3:14b). But Jesus insisted, "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15b). Jesus, true and humble human as well as eternal God, was eager to do what was required of any good Jew. Jesus thus publicly entered the community of those awaiting the Messiah. But making himself part of that community, he made it truly messianic.

The greatness of John, his pivotal place in the history of salvation, is seen in the great emphasis Luke gives to the announcement of his birth and the event itself—both made prominently parallel to the same occurrences in the life of Jesus. John attracted countless people to the banks of the Jordan, and it occurred to some people that he might be the Messiah. But he constantly deferred to Jesus, even to sending away some of his followers to become the first disciples of Jesus.

Perhaps John's idea of the coming of the Kingdom of God was not being perfectly fulfilled in the public ministry of Jesus. For whatever reason, when he was in prison he sent his disciples to ask Jesus if he was the Messiah. Jesus' answer showed that the Messiah was to be a figure like that of the Suffering Servant in Isaiah. John himself would share in the pattern of messianic suffering, losing his life to the revenge of Herodias.


