



Dear Friends,

I recently asked a few of my fellow Jesuits the date of their baptism. They looked at me perplexed, as they often do, and to a person said that they had no idea. "I assume it was a few months after my birth," replied one with the others nodding in consent.

My inquiry was inspired by a story I had read about Pope Francis. A few months ago, he was baptizing several babies in the Sistine Chapel. He encouraged the parents to teach their children the date of the baptism and to celebrate it every year, like a birthday. "It is like a birthday because baptism makes us reborn in Christian life," he said. "That is why I advise you to teach your children the date of their baptism as a new birthday: that every year they will remember and thank God for this grace of becoming a Christian."

I have to admit, when I read the Pope's comments, I had no idea what the date of my own baptism was. I have since dug through some records and found it, so watch your mail for an invite to my upcoming blowout baptism birthday party. Kidding. But I love the Pope's idea of finding ways of emphasizing the importance of baptism. It seems to me that in our attempt to live our faith we frequently underestimate the transformative power of our baptism and the profound implications for our daily life. In the second reading this Sunday, St Paul puts it this way, "Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life."

What would it look like for us as individuals and as the faith community of Old St. Patrick's to live in "newness of life"? How is God inviting us to live differently, perceiving each day as an invitation into the newness of life that only he can give? How are we being challenged to see others, including and perhaps most especially, those we find it difficult or impossible to love, with vision renewed by our baptismal faith? What would it look like for us to truly live in the freedom of Christ that liberates us to live and love more like him? How might we at Old St. Patrick's respond more generously to our call to be a Catholic faith community always open to the newness of life?

Let's keep praying for each other! Happy Fourth of July!

THE RETURN OF THE COMMON CUP

Next Sunday, **July 9th**, we will once again be distributing the Blood of Christ through the Common Cup. After three years of suspension due to the pandemic, we are happy to be able to offer the Eucharistic Banquet in its fullest expression.

We understand that there may be apprehension to receive through the cup. Please know that you are not obligated to receive under both species. The choice is up to you and your own comfortability in receiving in this communal way.

To begin, at most Masses, we will offer two cup stations in front of church and two in the balcony. We will reevaluate after a few weeks and add more stations if needed.

Please be assured that our Eucharistic Ministers will follow proper protocol for cleaning of the cup after each reception. It also may be helpful to note that CDC and the National Center for Infectious Diseases indicate that after clinical studies, the risk of transmitting sickness through the common cup is so small that it is undetectable. You can read a comprehensive article about this at *bit.ly/RiskFromCup* Also note that the practice of dipping the consecrated host into the consecrated wine–intinction–is not permissible. The theological reasoning behind this is that we always receive from the Lord who offers Himself to us; we receive Him, we do not take of our own.

Today's readings remind us to "be alive to God in Christ Jesus" and to be a welcoming community of believers.

In Matthew, Jesus says "whoever gives a cup of cold water to these lowly ones...will not want for a reward." Cold water? What about hot water for showers?

How can we provide welcome for the influx of asylum seekers and migrants coming to our city? Welcoming takes many forms. One way is to provide hot showers, soap and towels to cleanse both the body and spirit of the newly arrived people forced to shelter in police stations and field houses. The organization is called Shower Up Chicago and it was formed in 2021 with a focus on the homeless. Their website is https://showerup.org> chicago and the goal is "not to make dirty people clean, but to give hope to the HOPELESS." Dignity, hope and love to our friends is stated as their goal. They can use our help. Please Google it and consider supporting this welcoming group.

Today's Gospel reading challenges us to examine our values. Jesus said, "Those who love mother or father, daughter or son more than me are not worthy of me." It states we should love God more than our parents or children. Is this a realistic expectation or merely hyperbole to make us examine what we hold dear?

What do we truly value? Should money and status be end goals or simply ways we can help others? Aren't our "riches" meant to be shared? The corporal works of mercy, rooted in the words of Jesus Christ, have been practiced for centuries and involve sharing. Their origins are found in Matthew 25:35-36 where Jesus says, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, and I was thirsty and you gave me drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me; naked and you clothed me." These acts of kindness towards the vulnerable and marginalized have become hallmarks of the love and values of our community. Service to others and generosity are both present at Old St. Patrick's. Our hope is to continue these practices and extend them to our immigrant sisters and brothers in Christ. We greatly appreciate any help you can provide to the Immigrant Refugee Ministry (IRM). Help us to accompany others on their new paths in Chicago.

THE NORTH LAWNDALE KINSHIP INITIATIVE: AN OVERVIEW

The Initial Spark

Fr. Gregory Boyle, S.J., Founder of Homeboy Industries in Los Angeles, California, is internationally famous for his transformational ministry with LA's gang members. His message truly hit home when he preached before a packed congregation at the 2011 Old St. Patrick's Lenten Mission. He challenged those assembled to move beyond Christian charity and go the extra mile with God's people. Often he quoted his best-selling book, Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion. He said, "Charity is good, but the greater challenge and the call of the Gospels is for us to follow the example of Jesus who all throughout the New Testament entered into kinship with people, and especially those on the margins." He further explained, "True kinship means being where people are, knowing their names, respecting their culture, aspirations, accomplishments and struggles, walking with them and inviting them to walk with you." We can,, and quite often do charitable acts from a safe distance or without us ever really connecting with the "objects" of our charity. Kinship involves a deeper, more transformative human interconnection with God's people.

A Ministry Shift

That evening's message was so powerful that the Old St. Pat's leadership team met days later to decide how this congregation might respond to Fr. Boyle's (and Christ's) challenge. How can we go to the margins in a spirit of kinship with neighbors right here in Chicago? In the following months North Lawndale was identified as a neighborhood of focus. There was outreach to community leaders. Committees met. Brainstorming happened. Relationships blossomed, and the North Lawndale Kinship Initiative was born.

12 Years of Connection

The North Lawndale Kinship Initiative is Old St. Pat's Church's community development relationship with west side neighbors whose homes, churches, organizations, schools and businesses lie less than three miles to the southwest. Given structural racism and segregation deeply embedded in Chicago's history, the two communities, like other disparate ones in our city, had chasms in between. However, building a bridge across the chasm is at the heart of kinship (discipleship), and the driving force for the Kinship Initiative.

How It Works

Old St. Pat's members neither start nor lead initiatives in North Lawndale. Rather, the Kinship Initiative calls for interested Old St. Pat's members to open mindedly show up in support of good, important and successful works already happening in that neighborhood. Sometimes North Lawndalians participate in Old St. Pat's sponsored events as well. This kindred exchange brings people together for: committee work, rallies, discussion groups, peace circles, sporting events, worship, advisory boards, pro bono consulting, mentoring, tutoring, entertainment, staff support roles and more, and programming can involve: employment, economic development, housing, education, health and wellness, gardening, socializing, faith sharing, nutrition, recreation, recovery, reentry and more. The stated goal of the North Lawndale Kinship Initiative is mutual transformation. Ideally, through proximate human connections, people experience deep inner-change for the better. Hundreds of Old St. Pat's members and North Lawndalians have left their comfort zones to be at the margins together through the years, some in ongoing initiatives and some in one-time events. Over the Next Six Weeks

Rather, they are women and men who are ready, willing, able and eager to work - all they need is the opportunity. North Lawndale Work will provide support for clients of the North Lawndale Employment Network (NLEN) that helps them to get workforce ready. These stories will also spotlight members of Old St. Patrick's on the North Lawndale Works Team who serve as liaisons between NLEN and Old St. Pat's.

Unemployment, education, housing, public safety and health are at the pinnacle of justice issues to be addressed in North Lawndale today, but unemployment is one on which Old St. Pat's will focus with our westside neighbors at this time. Please follow the upcoming articles closely and consider supporting the effort.





PARTNERS RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (K-8th Grade)

The Partners Program offers thematic classes for children in preschool through Confirmation that enriches their understanding of God, the Church, sacraments, religious holidays, and values. The teachers use stories from Sacred Scriptures and religious textbooks in the classes.

Parents are expected to participate in workshops on the first Sunday of each month to help develop the monthly theme at home and foster the partnership. Classes are held twice a month on Sunday mornings from 10:15 to 11:30 in the Frances Xavier Warde School classrooms from September through April.

- First Communion typically takes place when a child is in 2nd grade. OSP requires one year of Religious Education PRIOR to registering for First Communion.
- Reconciliation typically takes place in 3rd grade.
- Confirmation is a two year process which begins in 7th grade.


FOUNDATIONS YOUTH MINISTRY



Saint Oliver Plunkett

Saint of the Day for July 2, 2023

The name of today's saint is especially familiar to the Irish and the English—and with good reason. The English martyred Oliver Plunkett for defending the faith in his native Ireland during a period of severe persecution.

Born in County Meath in 1629, Oliver studied for the priesthood in Rome and was ordained there in 1654. After some years of teaching and service to the poor of Rome he was appointed Archbishop of Armagh in Ireland. Four years later, in 1673, a new wave of anti-Catholic persecution began, forcing Archbishop Plunkett to do his pastoral work in secrecy and disguise and to live in hiding. Meanwhile, many of his priests were sent into exile, schools were closed, Church services had to be held in secret, and convents and seminaries were suppressed. As archbishop, Plunkett was viewed as ultimately responsible for any rebellion or political activity among his parishioners.

Archbishop Plunkett was arrested and imprisoned in Dublin Castle in 1679, but his trial was moved to London. After deliberating for 15 minutes, a jury found him guilty of fomenting revolt. He was hanged, drawn, and quartered in July 1681.

Pope Paul VI canonized Oliver Plunkett in 1975.

Stories like that of Oliver Plunkett seem to fit history. "Things like that don't happen today" is often our thought. But they do. False accusations, prejudice, anti-Catholic sentiments, racism, sexism, etc. are still an active reality in our day. Perhaps a prayer to Saint Oliver for peace and justice might be appropriate.


