Working for justice in everyday life is not easy. There are complex and sometimes difficult challenges encountered as we try to live our faith in the world. We are called to serve "the least of these," to "hunger and thirst for justice," to be peacemakers. The Lord is knocking at the door of our heart, every moment...inviting us to experience God's unconditional love, and calling us to offer that love to each other. Jesus spoke more about our individual responsibility to bring justice by loving our neighbors and doing good for those around us, especially the poor and marginalized. He talked more about the responsibility of individuals than of authorities to promote good. According to Jesus, we do the work of bringing justice through our love and persistence.

Jesus says righteousness means "restoration of right relationship," returning all people to the innocence and freedom that makes up the core of our human dignity. Our nation's founders were not saints, but they were people with a vision. They didn't live it perfectly but knew that the vision must win out over their own limitations. We hold to a vision as Catholics given to us by Christ. We have seen it expressed by men and women before us, even if lived imperfectly. We know in our own lives that we live out the vision of the Kingdom of God imperfectly as well. May we always ask God to purify our motives and strengthen our resolve to live more completely the plan of Christ we proclaim.

The 4th of July has always been a day that holds special meaning for me and marks the rhythm and the pace of the summer. What we celebrate this week is what all people strive for, and what every heart hungers for. Freedom. In his struggle for civil rights, Rev. Martin Luther Ling, Jr. chose not to attack America for her failings, but instead to challenge her. It has never been more important to reflect on what it means to offer life, liberty and happiness. I reflect on the hope that our faith can provide. A platform where a tremendous, fiery love is ignited in the human spirit to share an unexpected Divine glance of love for neighbor and friends, in Kinship.

This week the Gospel states, Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest in Me. There are no words that are more sacred to me. They are sacred because they reflect divine reality. We are celebrating what it means to live fully our faith according to our conscience. We need to stand up, to stand together; and to be prophetic in our desire for change. This week is an invitation to listen for our preconceptions and prejudices. Perhaps we are invited today to approach every person and every experience with true discernment, looking past the surface and into the heart of what God is doing. It can be hard to know what it means to "come to Jesus" when you're weary. Perhaps, we are being asked to give evidence before a skeptical world that despite the fireworks and violence there is path to justice, platformed with love.

Faith invites us to open ourselves to the possibility that we can be companions of change. When Jesus gave us the beatitudes and enacted the new law of love, he did more than provide a formula for happiness for us; he defined what the reign of God looks like. Whether we are running errands for a friend in need or walk in silence to end gun violence, we can dedicate ourselves to co-creating the world that God intended, trusting that God will satisfy our hunger for righteousness and justice for All.







#### THE RETURN OF THE COMMON CUP

Next Sunday, **July 9th**, we will once again be distributing the Blood of Christ through the Common Cup. After three years of suspension due to the pandemic, we are happy to be able to offer the Eucharistic Banquet in its fullest expression.

We understand that there may be apprehension to receive through the cup. Please know that you are not obligated to receive under both species. The choice is up to you and your own comfortability in receiving in this communal way.

To begin, at most Masses, we will offer two cup stations in front of church and two in the balcony. We will reevaluate after a few weeks and add more stations if needed.

Please be assured that our Eucharistic Ministers will follow proper protocol for cleaning of the cup after each reception. It also may be helpful to note that CDC and the National Center for Infectious Diseases indicate that after clinical studies, the risk of transmitting sickness through the common cup is so small that it is undetectable. You can read a comprehensive article about this at <u>bit.ly/RiskFromCup</u> Also note that the practice of dipping the consecrated host into the consecrated wine–intinction–is not permissible. The theological reasoning behind this is that we always receive from the Lord who offers Himself to us; we receive Him, we do not take of our own.

#### WHO ARE LEGAL IMMIGRANTS, AND HOW DO THEY COME TO THE U.S.?

There are 35.2 million legal immigrants living in the U.S. today, making up three-quarters of the foreign-born population. More than half are naturalized citizens (immigrants who have been granted U.S. citizenship). Most of the rest were admitted to the U.S. with a visa or other permission and the latter acquired legal permanent residency status, also known as a green card. A smaller number of legal immigrants are in the U.S. on a temporary basis.

#### THE MAJORITY ARE U.S. CITIZENS ...

Fully 21 million legal immigrants are naturalized citizens, who have taken an oath swearing allegiance to the U.S. Citizenship giving them the right to vote, protection from being deported and other legal rights.

Among immigrant adults who are eligible to become citizens, about 2/3 have done so, and the percentage has gone up in recent decades, though citizenship rates vary widely by birthplace. Only about four in 10 eligible immigrants from Mexico are citizens, compared with eight in 10 from the Middle East. In a Pew Research Center survey of Latino adults, lawful Mexican Immigrants, who had not applied for citizenship cited reasons that include lack of English proficiency, limited interest in applying and the financial cost of the application.

# NORTH LAWNDALE: HISTORY, CHALLENGE, AND HOPE



My participation in the North Lawndale Kinship Initiative at Old St. Pat's has been a great blessing. It has led to friendships with many good and like-minded people who share my passion for the pursuit of social justice. But more importantly it has taken me to North Lawndale and allowed me to get to know and respect on a personal level many people in that community. In the words of the Kinship Mission Statement we are able to "walk alongside one another in friendship, sharing our talents and resources to secure justice, opportunity and the transformation of our communities."

The North Lawndale neighborhood, just 17 blocks from Old St. Pat's, began as a refuge for Chicagoans fleeing the Great Fire of 1871. In the years that followed, North Lawndale grew into one of the most densely populated communities in the city as its industrial base expanded. This growth was fueled by the opening of plants by industrial giants such as McCormick Reaper, Western Electric and Sears Roebuck. Early in the twentieth century Eastern European Jews began arriving in large numbers and by 1930 Chicago's Jewish population was the third largest in the world with most residing in North Lawndale.

In the early 1950s African Americans began moving into North Lawndale, many as part of the great migration from the South and others who were displaced from their South Side Chicago homes by freeway construction and other urban renewal. As the black population grew, white residents moved out with many ending up in northern neighborhoods of the city. Despite the significant increase in population, no new housing was built in North Lawndale and severe overcrowding followed. In addition, work opportunities in the neighborhood were largely denied. Many black homeowners lost their property because of unscrupulous contract buying practices. These situations plus racist redlining by insurance and housing industries led to widespread poverty and divestment.















These injustices prompted Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. to designate North Lawndale as the base of his 1967 Freedom Summer, his first northern civil rights movement. The campaign emphasized the need for housing reform and prompted he and his wife Coretta to move into a substandard tenement apartment on 16th and Hamlin where they lived for nearly a year. Despite his well-publicized effort, no significant response was made by the city. After Dr. King's assassination in April 1968, conditions in North Lawndale rapidly deteriorated. After rioting, looting and burning, industries closed and in 1974 Sears moved its headquarters out of North Lawndale. By the year 2000 the population was reduced to 42,000, down from a high of 125,000 in 1960.

Despite this difficult past history, today North Lawndale is a 36,000 resident community on the rebound. It is home to many engaged leaders and vibrant and exciting community based initiatives of which many of us at Old St. Patrick's have the privilege of being a part. An organization worth noting among many is the North Lawndale Community Coordinating Council (NLCCC). The NLCCC brings the neighborhood's many organizations, businesses and elected officials together for collaborative and cohesive community organizing and development.






- First Communion typically takes place when a child is in 2nd grade.

# Saint Augustine Zhao Rong and Companions

Saint of the Day for July 9, 2023

Christianity arrived in China by way of Syria in the 600s. Depending on China's relations with the outside world, Christianity over the centuries was free to grow or was forced to operate secretly.

The 120 martyrs in this group died between 1648 and 1930. Eighty-seven of them were born in China, and were children, parents, catechists, or laborers, ranging in age from nine years to 72. This group includes four Chinese diocesan priests. The 33 foreign-born martyrs were mostly priests or women religious, especially from the Order of Preachers, the Paris Foreign Mission Society, the Friars Minor, Society of Jesus, Society of St. Francis de Sales (Salesians), and Franciscan Missionaries of Mary.

Augustine Zhao Rong was a Chinese soldier who accompanied Bishop John Gabriel Taurin Dufresse of the Paris Foreign Mission Society to his martyrdom in Beijing. Not long after his baptism, Augustine was ordained as a diocesan priest. He was martyred in 1815.

Beatified in groups at various times, these 120 martyrs were canonized together in Rome on October 1, 2000.

The People's Republic of China and the Roman Catholic Church each have well over a billion members, but there are only about 12 million Catholics in China. The reasons for that are better explained by historical conflicts than by a wholesale rejection of the Good News of Jesus Christ. The Chinese-born martyrs honored by today's feast were regarded by their persecutors as dangerous because they were considered allies of enemy, Catholic countries. The martyrs born outside China often tried to distance themselves from European political struggles relating to China, but their persecutors saw them as Westerners and therefore, by definition, anti-Chinese.

The Good News of Jesus Christ is intended to benefit all peoples; today's martyrs knew that. May 21st-century Christians live in such a way that Chinese women and men will be attracted to hear that Good News and embrace it.
