One of the questions that haunted Matthew the Evangelist was "Why do some people recognize that Jesus is the savior while others do not?" This question clearly bedeviled him, and he comes back to it repeatedly. Everyone had heard the same message; everyone had encountered the same charismatic individual and seen his deeds of power. In the years since Jesus' death and resurrection, the Spirit was clearly at work with power among his disciples. In spite of this evidence, many still did not believe that Jesus was the long-awaited messiah. In fact, by Matthew's day, an organized opposition to Jesus had developed. It was not the bloody persecution of later centuries, but it was antagonistic enough to cause pain for Matthew and his community. Throughout his Gospel, Matthew presents scenes from Jesus' life and teaching that try to make sense of this troubling reality.

The parables of this Sunday's Gospel reading identify discernment as key to faith in Jesus. Matthew believes that some people had prepared themselves well to understand the importance of Jesus and his ministry and took action as soon as they realized what they found. In this passage, discernment is not a static thing or something one stumbles upon haphazardly. It is the ability to recognize something of value, a skill born of preparation and practice. Years of trade allowed the merchant to understand the value of the pearl he found. Years of labor allowed the fishermen to discern what was valuable and what to discard. Years of search for buried treasure helped the new owner of the field recognize what was hidden there. Likewise, those who recognized Jesus were those who had prepared their own hearts through longtime spiritual practice and prayer.


The second element in Matthew's program of discernment is action. The merchant did not just find, he purchased and resold. The fishermen did not just drag their nets, they put what was good into buckets and discarded the rest. The traveler who came upon treasure in the field did not just find it and walk away, he sold all he had to possess it. Just so, Matthew tells his community, those who recognize the value of Christ must be ready to sacrifice everything to make his message and mission their own.

A life of active discernment is Matthew's response to the problem of recognition. Disciples who have prepared their hearts through prayer and works of mercy are those who will recognize the pearl of great price. Disciples who have the freedom to set aside all that is not Christ are the ones who will acquire a treasure beyond estimation.

SERVING GOD AND OUR NEW NEIGHBORS

For several weeks the Gospel readings have focused on the parables of Jesus, but understanding their many levels of meaning can, on occasion, be a challenging process. Spiritual discernment is often a path to wisdom. Solomon asked for "an understanding heart" and the ability "to distinguish right from wrong." God was very pleased with this unselfish request and the wisdom Solomon received was a special gift.

Today's psalm also asks God to bless us with compassion. "Let your compassion come." Consider these statements in light of our current immigrant crisis. We need understanding hearts and an abundance of compassion to accompany our sisters and brothers--be they asylum seekers, refugees or immigrants. We ask "How can we be of service?" "How can we accompany these new friends on their journeys?" One avenue is available at your local Chicago police station. The wisdom of the Spirit is a treasure buried within us and also a hidden "pearl of great price." The seekers of this hidden treasure and pearl were willing to sacrifice everything to obtain these gifts. Pope Francis said that "The Kingdom of Heaven is the opposite of the superfluous things the world offers, the opposite of a dull life: it is a treasure that renews everyday life and leads it to extend towards wider horizons." What "wider horizons" are we being called to discover? Are we willing to share to become more active followers of Jesus? What will we share? Will it be our time or resources or both? The Immigrant and Refugee Ministry of Old St Patrick's thanks you in advance for your help, which is both needed and appreciated. Do we "understand all these things" as Jesus asked? Possibly not, but we can reach out with helping hands and hearts of compassion when we accompany our sisters and brothers as they settle in Chicago. We can both understand their needs and, hopefully, help enrich their experiences here in our sanctuary city.

MEETING PEOPLE WHERE THEY ARE AND GETTING THEM TO WORK

When I graduated from my social work program, I applied to more than 150 jobs across the metro Chicago area, each requiring an application, resume, and unique cover letter. When I finally received my offer letter from North Lawndale Employment Network (NLEN), I was overjoyed. Since starting my job 2 years ago, I've watched hundreds of job-seekers line up outside of job fairs or wait in our lobby to meet with our staff. People in North Lawndale *want to work* but are frequently shut out of employment opportunities in the neighborhood. For multiple social and economic reasons, they cannot count on the relative ease of finding and locking down decent work that I have experienced.

Creating A Community That Works

The North Lawndale Employment Network has spent 23 years breaking down often overlooked and underestimated barriers to employment, and it has changed thousands of lives in the process. Job-seekers receive quality job readiness training, transitional employment at Sweet Beginnings, our honey bee centered social enterprise, and continuous coaching and mentorship support from our staff. Our job-seekers graduate from our program with improved resumes, references, and skills to secure good local jobs. The Old St. Patrick's North Lawndale Works program is a key partner in advancing our mission.

Getting to the first day of a new job requires transportation, a work uniform or outfit, a working phone, access to childcare to free up the job seeker, and sometimes even assistance with bills, and the North Lawndale Works fund has helped fill those needs. The generosity of Old St's Pat's and the North Landale Works Team has made transit passes, work uniforms, payment of back rent, phone and utility bills and childcare possible when it might not have been otherwise. As a result, NLEN program graduates have moved into stable and secure housing, recovered from traumatic events, and started in training programs. North Lawndale Works helps enable our current and future program participants to make u-turns in their lives and start their new careers.





Everyone in North Lawndale and across Chicago deserves the chance to build better lives for themselves and their families, and your support of the North Lawndale Works campaign is an active way to live out the values of *caritas* (love), *tzedek* (justice) and kinship. 

FOUNDATIONS YOUTH MINISTRY


REGISTRATION FOR FOUNDATIONS WILL REMAIN OPEN.

CINCINNATI TEEN WORKTOUR REFLECTION By Mary Bridget Molony, A Rising Senior At University of Chicago Laboratory School

Cincinnati, Ohio

VORK

Before I left on each of my three worktours, I had no doubt that the service that I would complete with my fellow foundations teens would be enlightening and important. Every year so far, I've been right. The most recent worktour I went on, in Cincinnati, Ohio, was no different. Over the course of the week, my small group and I worked at Matthew: 25 Ministries, New Life Furniture Bank, FreeStore Food Bank, Wesley Chapel Ministry, and Shelterhouse homeless shelter. Each of these organizations and their missions are distinctly different, and each one taught me and my group new things about service. My personal favorite place that my group served was FreeStore food bank. We had the privilege of speaking with one of their employees, who was in charge of the organization's SNAP program. We got to hear her perspective on what it was like to be in her role, and to go to the state and nation capitals to advocate for people who are experiencing food insecurity. It was very meaningful to me to see someone who was serving on a higher plane than we were, by trying to make actual policy change to help the people we were trying to help with manual labor.

Another aspect of worktour that is just as valuable as the service part, if not more valuable, is the connections that are formed with other Foundations teens, and our leaders. On worktour, it is so much easier to form meaningful connections with people than it is at home. The combination of doing important work, not having any preconceived notions about each other, and not having access to our phones really fosters friendships. On every worktour, it shocks me the way that in just a few days, you can go from not knowing someone really at all to laughing and talking late into the night, even about things you don't normally talk about with other people.

Another piece of worktour that I really appreciate is the way that it makes faith accessible. At home, there are many things in my life that I let get in the way of my relationship with God. However, on worktour, being surrounded by other people who value their faith and spending intentional time thinking about God makes it so much easier to foster my faith.

For all of these reasons and so many more that I can't even articulate, worktour has been such an important aspect of my high school career. I can't thank the Old St. Pat's community enough for supporting Foundations and enabling us to have these life-changing experiences.

Blessed Solanus Casey Saint of the Day for July 30, 2023

Barney Casey became one of Detroit's best-known priests even though he was not allowed to preach formally or to hear confessions! Barney came from a large family in Oak Grove, Wisconsin. At the age of 21, and after he had worked as a logger, a hospital orderly, a streetcar operator, and a prison guard, he entered St. Francis Seminary in Milwaukee where he found the studies difficult. He left there, and in 1896, joined the Capuchins in Detroit, taking the name Solanus. His studies for the priesthood were again arduous. On July 24, 1904, Solanus was ordained, but because his knowledge of theology was judged to be weak, he was not given permission to hear confessions or to preach. A Franciscan Capuchin who knew him well said this annoying restriction "brought forth in him a greatness and a holiness that might never have been realized in any other way."

During his 14 years as porter and sacristan in Yonkers, New York, the people there recognized Solanus as a fine speaker. James Derum, his biographer writes, "For, though he was forbidden to deliver doctrinal sermons, he could give inspirational talks, or feverinos, as the Capuchins termed them." His spiritual fire deeply impressed his listeners. Father Solanus served at parishes in Manhattan and Harlem before returning to Detroit, where he was porter and sacristan for 20 years at St. Bonaventure Monastery. Every Wednesday afternoon he conducted well-attended services for the sick. A co-worker estimates that on the average day 150 to 200 people came to see Father Solanus in the front office. Most of them came to receive his blessing; 40 to 50 came for consultation. Many people considered him instrumental in cures and other blessings they received.

Father Solanus' sense of God's providence inspired many of his visitors. "Blessed be God in all his designs" was one of his favorite expressions. The many friends of Father Solanus helped the Capuchins begin a soup kitchen during the Depression. Capuchins are still feeding the hungry there today. In failing health, Solanus was transferred to the Capuchin novitiate in Huntington, Indiana, in 1946, where he lived for ten years until needing to be hospitalized in Detroit. Father Solanus died on July 31, 1957. An estimated 20,000 people passed by his coffin before his burial in St. Bonaventure Church in Detroit.At the funeral Mass, the provincial Father Gerald said: "His was a life of service and love for people like me and you. When he was not himself sick, he nevertheless suffered with and for you that were sick. When he was not physically hungry, he hungered with people like you. He had a divine love for people. He loved people for what he could do for them and for God, through them." In 1960, a Father Solanus Guild was formed in Detroit to aid Capuchin seminarians. By 1967, the guild had 5,000 members—many of them grateful recipients of his practical advice and his comforting assurance that God would not abandon them in their trials. Solanus Casey was declared Venerable in 1995, and beatified on November 18, 2017.


