



Today's reflection is about Jesus revealing himself to the Samaritan woman at the well, as recorded in John. The gospel is so pregnant with the encounter narrative at Jacob's well between Jesus and the Samaritan woman. Jesus went to the well to rest and the woman went to the well to get water. I am reminded of the wonderful sharing by Kenneth Hughes, SJ describing the encounter from the Gospel.

"Jesus is tired. A woman arrives. She is tired too. She is tired of waiting half the day to get to the well. Tired of carrying a heavy jar under the hot noonday sun. She is tired of rejection, tired of hurtful relationships, tired of broken promises. And both are thirsty. Jesus thirsts for water to drink, to cool his brow, to wash his hands. He thirsts for understanding, thirsts for a soul friend, thirsts for a compassionate heart. He thirsts for the hearts of his people. The woman thirsts for water too. She also thirsts for love and wholeness, and for acceptance. She thirsts for the truth of belief. Mutual tiredness and mutual thirst draw them together at this well. They have need for one another. He is living water but has no jar to hold it. She has the jar, but no living water."

In the Gospel today, Jesus doesn't care about barriers, or rules, if they are meant to separate us. In today's story, all Jesus cared about was the Samaritan woman and her people. This is the story of the beginning of a flood of belief that began with one little cupful of water. The woman at the well was the beginning - she's an innocent bystander who has her life changed forever because she happened to go to the Well of Jacob on a certain day, at a certain time, just like she had done probably just about every day for who knows how long. The extraordinary entered the ordinary - and the visit changes everything.

There are so many people thirsting to be known and loved for who they are. Every week God gives us that extravagant love, despite all our weakness and barriers. If we want our worship here to be authentic, to be worship in Spirit and Truth, then we must go out and tell others about this love, this gift of God. The heart learns, first, to model service on Jesus, who came not to be served but to serve, who taught his followers to let go of power, who pronounced the last first and the first last, and whose table-companionship was as inclusive as God's mercy.

As I rethink the story now and allow the richness and nuance of the encounter between Jesus and his would-be follower to wash over me, I'm noticing grace in very different places than I used to. I'm finding tremendous "Good News" in the way Jesus engages with the woman. Good news I can carry into my own Lenten reflections and practices. Jesus's willingness to break the social rules of his day means that we, his followers, must live into the truth that people are more than the sum of their political, racial, cultural, and economic identities. Jesus calls us to put aside the stereotypes we carry, the prejudices we nurse, the social and cultural lines we draw. He invites us to look at the Samaritan woman and see a sister and an apostle.

Jesus recognized the value of the woman at the well and in so doing encouraged someone who was perceived to be of little value to act as an instrument of preaching the good news of salvation. It is our mission to follow Jesus' example, and to advance the cause of justice and mercy in whatever way we can. I can relate to this story. I can relate to the exhaustion and the need to believe that our lives are making a difference. History tells us that when we are called, we find extraordinary ways to respond. Pastoral leadership involves not only a new relationship to the community; it involves a new responsibility for ministerial relationships within the community. It is about the capacity for each of us to walk a rocky road of despair and disillusionment, experiencing the presence of one alongside us, who reveals that the miracle is real. It is about the God who is constantly striving to "make all things new".

It has been a busy six months for the Immigrant and Refugee Ministry (IRM) at Old St. Pat's (OSP). As the Chicago media has noted, around 34,000 migrants, mostly from Venezuela, have been arriving in Chicago during that time. The IRM has worked closely with 5 of these families. In addition, we have assisted families from Syria, Myanmar, Colombia, Honduras, the Republic of the Congo, Afghanistan, and Venezuela.

Recently, representatives from the Archdiocese came out to film our volunteers during a visit to the Chicago Furniture Bank and an apartment setup. To watch the video, visit *<u>bit.ly/OSPIRMcatholicchi</u>* 

The most recent apartment setup took place in Pilsen, on February 2, for the Eduardo Palma Family. IRM member, Sister Mary Frances McLaughlin, BVM, brought this apartment to our attention. Eduardo Palma had accompanied his brother, José Palma, whose family was referred to us by Todos Para Todos, a group assisting migrants to move out of shelters. José's family was placed in an apartment in Oak Park, with assistance from IRM member, Mary Rodino, but there were no other apartments available in that building.

Our Crossroads' readers should also know that OSP's leadership in creating the apartment setup process has been noted by Catholic Charities. They have created a guide for other parishes to provide similar support to migrant families, based on our process, which we learned as we went along. By the end of last year, we heard that 15 more parishes raised their hand to do what OSP has been doing for the last 5 years. Amen! Alleluia!

On February 11, IRM hosted a household items collection event. This event was skillfully and successfully organized by IRM member, Terry Scully. He has reported that **enough supplies were collected to fill 22 large storage bins that will provide for 4 families.** Plus, 20 pillows were stuffed into bags. In addition, he said that \$300 worth of grocery cards were donated, along with \$935 in cash and checks.

Terry concluded, "It was just a great morning to spend with wonderful people involved with this ministry, and a privilege to provide these goods to needy asylum-seeking families in the coming year."

The need for OSP's Immigrant & Refugee Ministry is great, and, to date, so has been the generosity of OSP members in supporting this ministry. Thank you! Mil gracias! # AN EVENING WITH ENCORE: "Celtic Imagination and Sacred Art" With special guest John David Mooney

John David Mooney is an internationally-recognized sculptor and environmental artist who has executed public sculptures and temporary sculptural works all over the world. Known for his ambitious large scale pieces, Mooney's work has transformed iconic public buildings, lit up skylines and redesigned public spaces. Mooney has consistently taken a multi-disciplinary approach to art, incorporating architecture, urban planning, and history into his work. As an artist, he has also made light his signature, using unconventional light sources as bold sculptural elements.

John David served as the Artist for the renovations of Old Saint Patrick's and the restoration of Thomas O'Shaughnessy's holistic Design scheme along with the Architect of the project, Larry Booth.

He is the Founder and Artistic Director of the John David Mooney Foundation, a not-for-profit educational organization that presents international artists and architects to Chicago. It's Advanced Interdisciplinary Study Center prepares postgraduates with the necessary tools to fulfill their responsibility to society. The JDM Foundation's Ukrainian Art Bridge Fellowship program brings "at risk" Ukrainian artists and their families to Chicago and supports them with a residency and studios, as well as showcasing their work in the Foundation's International Currents Gallery. Since Russia's atrocious aggression, the John David Mooney Foundation has hosted twelve displaced Ukrainians, whose lives have been threatened and work disrupted. The next Ukrainian artist, a sculptor, is scheduled to arrive this March.












# NORTHSIDE BOOK CLUB (Formerly Encounter Book Club) March 25 | 6:30 PM | The Book Cellar in Lincoln Square

#### **Saint Katharine Drexel** Saint of the Day for March 3, 2024

If your father is an international banker and you ride in a private railroad car, you are not likely to be drawn into a life of voluntary poverty. But if your mother opens your home to the poor three days each week and your father spends half an hour each evening in prayer, it is not impossible that you will devote your life to the poor and give away millions of dollars. Katharine Drexel did that.

Born in Philadelphia in 1858, she had an excellent education and traveled widely. As a rich girl, Katharine also had a grand debut into society. But when she nursed her stepmother through a three-year terminal illness, she saw that all the Drexel money could not buy safety from pain or death, and her life took a profound turn.

Katharine had always been interested in the plight of the Indians, having been appalled by what she read in Helen Hunt Jackson's A Century of Dishonor. While on a European tour, she met Pope Leo XIII and asked him to send more missionaries to Wyoming for her friend Bishop James O'Connor. The pope replied, "Why don't you become a missionary?" His answer shocked her into considering new possibilities. Back home, Katharine visited the Dakotas, met the Sioux leader Red Cloud and began her systematic aid to Indian missions.

Katharine Drexel could easily have married. But after much discussion with Bishop O'Connor, she wrote in 1889, "The feast of Saint Joseph brought me the grace to give the remainder of my life to the Indians and the Colored." Newspaper headlines screamed "Gives Up Seven Million!" After three and a half years of training, Mother Drexel and her first band of nuns—Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored—opened a boarding school in Santa Fe. A string of foundations followed. By 1942, she had a system of black Catholic schools in 13 states, plus 40 mission centers and 23 rural schools. Segregationists harassed her work, even burning a school in Pennsylvania. In all, she established 50 missions for Indians in 16 states.

Two saints met when Mother Drexel was advised by Mother Cabrini about the "politics" of getting her order's Rule approved in Rome. Her crowning achievement was the founding of Xavier University in New Orleans, the first Catholic university in the United States for African Americans.

At 77, Mother Drexel suffered a heart attack and was forced to retire. Apparently her life was over. But now came almost 20 years of quiet, intense prayer from a small room overlooking the sanctuary. Small notebooks and slips of paper record her various prayers, ceaseless aspirations, and meditations. She died at 96 and was canonized in 2000.




