

More than a few poets have wondered about the donkey. From G.K. Chesterton to Mary Oliver and many more I am sure, poets have played in their imaginations with the elements of the story of Jesus' final entry into Jerusalem. In The Poet Thinks About the Donkey, Oliver observes that the donkey is not seen as a particularly brave or noble or smart beast and yet she wonders...

But the donkey, tied to a tree as usual, waited. Then he let himself be led away. Then he let the stranger mount.

Never had he seen such crowds! And I wonder if he at all imagined what was to happen. Still, he was what he had always been: small, dark, obedient.

I hope, finally, he felt brave. I hope, finally, he loved the man who rode so lightly upon him, as he lifted one dusty hoof and stepped, as he had to, forward.

What does Oliver's wondering spur in your imagination? Does it open up a new doorway of memory or prayer? Does it help illuminate this familiar and fundamental story of Jesus in some new way?

Ever since I was a child, I have loved the rituals of Holy Week that invite us to draw close to Jesus and follow him as the paschal mystery unfolds. As a kid, my attention would be drawn to the details of the story, the interplay of light and darkness, the feelings that welled up when witnessing Jesus' courage and pain or Peter's collapsed bravado.

God's spirit moving in the stories of this week, seeks to engage our hearts and imaginations. We never enter Holy Week the same way twice. We bring the graces and struggles of this past year and our lifetimes. As the poets understand so deeply, we are invited to enter the prayer of Holy Week with our whole selves, including our imaginations. Let the story speak to you, linger on words or images that capture your attention, even the donkey! Every bit of it can serve to open us up to a deeper appreciation of God's wondrous love poured out in Jesus. Pay attention to tears and the moments that break your heart. God is speaking. Pay attention. Savor it.

As we make our way together in the journey of Holy Week, may we know the presence of God's abiding spirit, drawing us to richer attentiveness to Jesus and his passion.

Let's keep praying for each other!

You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

Our journeys are unique, and filled with personal narratives that shape our understanding of the world. Yet, during our individual stories, there is a common thread that binds us - the unwavering presence of God. Jesus Father's love was a source of comfort. His life with "Abba" filled much of his thought and time. I find myself reading the passion differently this year. As the stages of the passion unfold, my focus shifts to Jesus' relationship with God, His Abba. Jesus believed that as He navigated His death, that His Abba was always there, and a steadfast companion on His journey. Jesus was talking to His friends about nothing less than the kingdom of heaven, the dwelling place of His Father - a place where God's will is done.

The Gospel from Mark 14:1-15:47 Jesus is at the home of Simon the Leper, sitting at a table with many other people. An unnamed woman arrives with a jar of costly perfume and pours it over Jesus' head. Others at the table criticize the woman; the perfume could have been sold and the money given to the poor. Jesus comment probably made no sense to His dining companions at the time. They did not know Jesus would soon die, but Jesus knew, and perhaps somehow this woman knew. The woman had been led to prepare Jesus body for coming events, and so she has been memorialized in scripture. In the eyes of Jesus, this woman held a unique and elevated position that was often at odds with the cultural norms of his time. Personal anointing was a powerful blessing. An amazing symbol of God's presence in people's lives. Oil, in the Old Testament, had much significance and blessing. Oil was used to cleanse and sanctify people and items, as blessed objects of the Lord. Matthew has the woman understand what the disciples do not...that Jesus is not just a moral teacher, but an anointed son of God, the Messiah. She anointed Jesus, and perhaps it is through this anointing that Jesus was able to face his pain and requisite His purpose equipped for an effective walk towards His death.

From the moment we are born, there's one inevitable truth that binds every living organism on this planet: we will one day die. I think the feeling we get from those random gut punches of profound loss, or grief, of lostness, teach us something that resurrection Sunday never can. It may be true that we live more in Holy Saturday than the resurrection Sundays. We learn that some things in our life do go to the tomb. Our lives are both darkness and light; sadness and joy; death and resurrection. We can't possibly know gratefulness if we never experienced things that gave us something to be grateful for. The resurrection is God's promise that in the end all things will be rebuilt. All things will be restored to their former glory. God can meet us in our loss, our grief, our disappointment just as much as she meets us in the victory of Resurrection Sunday. The trouble we walk in feels different when we know God is walking with us. The invitation is here for us all today to place our trust in Jesus, and to like Jesus await new life - the life of resurrection. Our falls are not failures but opportunities to rise again, strengthened by the knowledge that we are not alone. Each challenge, each stumble, is a steppingstone toward growth and resilience. May we enter this Holy week cherishing our simple pleasures, finding strength in adversity, and, above all, recognizing the constant presence of our Abba and loving God.

Our program is offered over the course of six consecutive weeks. Our groups are small by design so that they are comfortable and informal. Our next program will start on Thursday, April 25th.





Saint Oscar Arnulfo Romero Saint of the Day for March 24, 2024

The night before he was murdered while celebrating Mass, Archbishop Oscar Romero of San Salvador said on the radio: "I would like to appeal in a special way to the men of the army, and in particular to the troops of the National Guard, the police, and the garrisons. Brothers, you belong to our own people. You kill your own brother peasants; and in the face of an order to kill that is given by a man, the law of God that says' Do not kill!" should prevail.

"No soldier is obliged to obey an order counter to the law of God. No one has to comply with an immoral law. It is the time now that you recover your conscience and obey its dictates rather than the command of sin...Therefore, in the name of God, and in the name of this long-suffering people, whose laments rise to heaven every day more tumultuous, I beseech you, I beg you, I command you! In the name of God: "Cease the repression!"

Simultaneously, Romero had eloquently upheld the gospel and effectively signed his own death warrant.

When he was appointed archbishop of San Salvador in 1977, Bishop Romero was considered a very "safe" choice. He had served as auxiliary bishop there for four years before his three years as bishop of Santiago de Maria.

Oscar's father wanted him to be a carpenter—a trade for which he demonstrated some talent. Seminary classes in El Salvador preceded his studies at Rome's Gregorian University and his ordination in 1942. After earning a doctorate in ascetical theology, he returned home and became a parish priest and later rector of an interdiocesan seminary.

Three weeks after his appointment as archbishop, Romero was shaken by the murder of his good friend Jesuit Father Rutilio Grande, a vigorous defender of the rights of the poor. Five more priests were assassinated in the Archdiocese of San Salvador during Romero's years as its shepherd.

When a military junta seized control of the national government in 1979, Archbishop Romero publicly criticized the US government for backing the junta. His weekly radio sermons, broadcast throughout the country, were regarded by many as the most trustworthy source of news available.

Romero's funeral was celebrated in the plaza outside the cathedral and drew an estimated 250,000 mourners.

His tomb in the cathedral crypt soon drew thousands of visitors each year. On February 3, 2015, Pope Francis authorized a decree recognizing Oscar Romero as a martyr for the faith. His beatification took place in San Salvador on May 23, 2015, and he was canonized on October 14, 2018.

Oscar Romero and many other Latin American martyrs for the faith were falsely accused of advocating a Marxist-inspired "theology of liberation." Following Jesus always requires choices. Romero's fiercest critics conveniently dismissed his choices as politically inspired. An incarnational faith must be expressed publicly.


