On Easter morning, we hear John the Evangelist's account of the resurrection. John does not include details that we find in the other Gospels. He does not mention the earthquake, the angels and their triumphant message that Christ is risen. Instead, John focuses all his attention on one particular disciple, the follower known today as the "Beloved Disciple," and how he came to believe. Although Mary Magdalene found the empty tomb and Peter entered to investigate it, only the Beloved Disciple saw and believed.

That belief hinged on two small details. Jesus' burial shroud had been unwound, and the head-covering had been rolled up and set aside. Until the Beloved Disciple saw these discarded cloths, he had likely assumed, along with Mary Magdalene and Peter, that Jesus' body had been stolen. But no one stealing a body would have unwrapped it; Jesus' corpse would have been much easier to transport (and hide) fully bound and tied up. The empty burial cloths signified to the Beloved Disciple that the one who had been bound was now free.

The fact that these trivial details, so easy to overlook, spoke so eloquently tells us that the Spirit was already at work, drawing the Beloved Disciple's attention to the risen Christ. Mary Magdalene and the other disciples believed only when they saw and touched Jesus, but the Beloved Disciple believed purely on the evidence of the burial cloths. It was love that gave small details such great meaning. Even in John's spare prose, one can still feel traces of the Beloved Disciple's excited relief, "Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed."

John the Evangelist wrote his Gospel for future disciples who would also have to rely on small details to believe. He wanted to make sure that the disciples who came after him would recognize the significance of the "burial cloth revelations" in their lives. This Sunday's Gospel invites us to pay attention to the small yet powerful pieces of evidence that Christ is still alive.

It was love that opened the Beloved Disciple's heart. A long-lasting and deep love for Christ made him ready to recognize the Lord still alive and present. This same insightful love can be ours as well. One of the outcomes of Lent can be a deepening of our love for God and neighbor, a depth that can help us pay attention to our own "burial cloth revelations." Fleeting moments of beauty, joy or human connection that we may have once regarded as trivial will now perhaps reveal a deeper meaning as our newly trained hearts find in them evidence of the living Christ.

When I prepared this Easter reflection, it brought me back. My Dad and I always had a tradition of being present for the Easter Vigil in church. We both loved to experience the catechumens sacramental "Yes"! Last year because of his illness we watched the Easter Vigil together on livestream from his room. As I reflect on the empty tomb, for me it is a sign of new life, a new beginning, for everything is being emptied. It means dying to our old selves and being open to a new and different life. A life of wholeness and holiness. A season that is as much about darkness as it is about light. And I find myself seeking the cusp of great Joy: the Resurrection. Easter is a journey that we take each year to reaffirm and renew our faith, preparing our hearts for the joy that will come as surely as the springtime.

Easter is, without a shadow of a doubt, my favorite time of year – my favorite holiday, and my favorite season in the church calendar. As Lent gives way to Easter, it seems that everywhere we look darkness is giving way to light. Spring is coming, bringing with it new life and a fresh start after a very long, very dark winter.

Easter asks us to reach toward Joy, even on the days when we've lost our hope, even when we think there is nothing else to do, to remember God is there for us, , God is there for us in the unknown to guide us. In the days before my dad's death from pancreatic cancer he was fully present to us. Though my dad was sad knowing he was losing his battle with cancer we were given precious time to bring him home and to say goodbye. Certainly, our belief in Resurrection makes those death-dealing times of our lives endurable and enables us to hold on to hope. Life is changed not ended. But the gift of Resurrection, the joy of Easter, the reality of the Paschal Mystery is not about bodily resuscitation or timely remissions - although those are always welcome. For me, it is about trusting that God will always provide - that the stone will be rolled away and I will be able – somehow - to walk out into the light again - from death to new life. There are lots of assists in that stone-rolling process, ways that God lures others into the act of redemption. Jesus unbound himself and neatly folded everything up. However, we need God to help us unbind the losses and our grief.

Easter is the celebration of the first proclamation that Jesus did not remain dead. I have often thought of Mary weeping looking into the tomb. And she's so caught up in the moment and in her grief that she doesn't recognize Jesus. And then Jesus calls her by her name and she recognizes her God. In the blink of an eye, Mary's grief and sadness turned into Joy. My Dad was a feast maker. He loved to entertain and bring people to the table to share a meal. Easter is a feast which gives us hope and encouragement. Easter reminds us that life is worth living and needs to be shared. People we love who cross our paths, become catalysts for profound transformation. These relationships, reverberate deep within us, offering insights into love, resilience, and the core of our shared faith. Jesus came searching, seeking, and asking. And God brought needed change. May we be people who open the door and invite God into our messy and chaotic lives. And as we do, may God bring us healing, renewal, and peace. Easter is a special time to celebrate this, Paschal Mystery. May we look for ways every day to trust it and the God who makes it happen, the God who always provides help to roll the stones away. May our Resurrections be Expansive, Generous and Receptive and may there be room enough to give everyone a seat at a Joy filled table.

It is a Happy Easter Sunday for the Jimenez family that is living in their new apartment in Pilsen – lovingly prepared by the Immigrant and Refugee Ministry (IRM) setup crew earlier this month. Once again, an empty space became a home and the end to a long journey in search of a new and safer life. This was only possible due to the generosity of the members of Old St. Pat's. This generosity is reflected through the volunteers who set up the apartments, make the beds, hang the shower curtains, put dishes in the kitchen cabinets, and food in the refrigerator to create a home.



It is possible because there is a Chicago Furniture Bank where we can find furniture donated by people all over Chicagoland. It is possible because so many of our OSP members donate household items when the IRM holds its household items collection like the one so many of you contributed to last month. It is possible because organizations like Catholic Charities and the Heartland Alliance, that make first contact with migrant families, and then connect us to these families. It is possible because so many of you write checks or scan QR codes to donate the funds that support the work of the IRM. THANK YOU.

But, setting up an apartment for a migrant family is only the first step. IRM members strive to become "friends of the family." Through the IRM's "family liaisons" the goal is to be good neighbors. The liaisons help the rest of the IRM committee get to know the family and to remain available to them in their early days of resettlement. To further this good neighbor policy, the IRM is planning a gathering on June 23 in the OSP courtyard. Before the pandemic, we held such a gathering for our migrant families to meet each other, and for parishioners to stop by and say hello to the families they have been supporting. To date, those families have come to us from Syria, Myanmar, Colombia, Honduras, Afghanistan, the Republic of the Congo, Somalia, and Venezuela. In fact, the Jimenez family represents our sixth family from Venezuela. **So, mark your calendars and plan to stop by after the 9:00 and 11:00 masses on Sunday, June 23.** 

Finally, the IRM has **one more request of your generosity.** Two of our moms are expecting **baby girls** this Spring. If you have baby girl clothes in the 0-6-month range, in good condition, that you no longer need, please consider donating them to help our expectant moms. You can bring your donation to the 711 W. Monroe building, but please indicate on the bag or box that they should be passed along to IRM staff person, Krista Chinchilla-Patzke.





#### Saint Stephen of Mar Saba Saint of the Day for March 31, 2024

A "do not disturb" sign helped today's saint find holiness and peace.

Stephen of Mar Saba was the nephew of Saint John Damascene, who introduced the young boy to monastic life beginning at age 10. When he reached 24, Stephen served the community in a variety of ways, including guest master. After some time he asked permission to live a hermit's life. The answer from the abbot was yes and no: Stephen could follow his preferred lifestyle during the week, but on weekends he was to offer his skills as a counselor. Stephen placed a note on the door of his cell: "Forgive me, Fathers, in the name of the Lord, but please do not disturb me except on Saturdays and Sundays."

Despite his calling to prayer and quiet, Stephen displayed uncanny skills with people and was a valued spiritual guide.

His biographer and disciple wrote about Stephen: "Whatever help, spiritual or material, he was asked to give, he gave. He received and honored all with the same kindness. He possessed nothing and lacked nothing. In total poverty he possessed all things."

#### Stephen died in 794.

Saint Stephen of Mar Saba knew the value of solitude. Even though he was generous and served whoever came to him, he relished his time alone. Maybe we can learn from him the value of solitude and seek it out a little more in our lives.


