

GOSPEL MEDITATION



We can embrace and relish each moment of our lives as a sacred sacrament or nonchalantly and robotically attend to what life presents. We have our feet in two worlds. One is holy and sacred, and the other is profane and secular. Which one has the greater claim on us? To what do we devote most of our energy? We can easily be consumed with the particular demands and essentials of daily life: family, work, obligations, and the like, that we don't really notice anything more than what is right before us. We become masters at "doing" and neglect our need to "savor." Jesus reminds his friends that "as it was in the days of Noah, so it will be at the coming of the Son of Man. In those days before the flood, they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, up to the day Noah entered the ark. They did not know until the flood came and carried them all away."

While certain things require our daily attention, we cannot become so consumed with them that we fail to see the larger picture of what is coming. For the Christian, Advent is the time to pause, reflect, and savor. It is a time to see life as a sacrament of the moment and not just an investment in secular interests, pleasures, and personal obligations. It is easy to get distracted, lazy, preoccupied, and tired. Apathy can quickly wreak havoc on the most dedicated of souls. Whatever we can do this Advent season to be more attentive, focused, alert, and watchful will serve us well. It will make us eager and well-prepared to meet our Lord when He comes. It is for certain that He will come.

Who made me? What is my purpose? What will happen to me when I die? These are pivotal questions that, in life's busyness, we hardly find time to ask and answer. They define who we are, and the answers we provide serve as guideposts and anchors in the seas of our lives. Advent is the perfect time to make friends with our souls. It is a time to perk ourselves up, open our eyes, ears, and hearts and seek God's presence in the simple moments of our lives. God is with us. Ask God to grant you a deeper appreciation for His presence and the gift of attentiveness.

Immigrants and Refugees: A Faith Journey

Light one purple candle. HOPE

"Come, let us climb the LORD's mountain, to the house of the God of Jacob." — Is 2:3

Immigrants and refugees are more than an opportunity for practicing mercy. They are a reminder of our humanity, a humanity called to migrate back to God. As we begin our Advent, these readings remind us that God also journeyed, as Emmanuel, into creation. Emmanuel, Jesus Christ, established the Lord's house on the mountain and still calls us to journey there. As we prepare for the coming of a migrant God, keep in mind our own migrant humanity here on earth.



In the second reading St. Paul reminds us that now is the time to awake from sleep. (Rom 13:11) When we awaken, we rub our eyes so that we might see more clearly. This Advent do not give in to the slumber of staying put; instead use our new eyes to recognize our own migrating DNA. Just as all of humanity is journeying toward God, migrants on earth call us to journey with them. Reflect on what we would leave behind. What would we bring with us on the journey? What keeps us complacent, standing still? When should we be moving and journeying? "For you do not know on which day your Lord will come." (Mt 24:42)

We dignify our immigrant and refugee family when we recognize our own call of journey toward God as well as the call to welcome them. We are one family. And as one family we **Hope** for the time that our journey is complete. They call it the silent killer.

They call it the silent killer. Loneliness. In this era of social disconnection, coupled with a constant reminder of what others are doing, loneliness is at an all-time high.

For many, loneliness can stem from disconnection from our family, the grief of losing a loved one, disconnection from God, and even from our own striving toward our aspirations. It can be an incredibly painful place to be as we human beings feel cast aside, or plainly out of view.

Loneliness compounds. In other words, for those who are experiencing it, it can continue to grow as time passes, and we are swallowed up by how normal the state of isolation has become. For some, it can feel like there is simply no way out of the hole of loneliness, and for others, it is deserved. But let me just say... loneliness is not a feeling that has come to stay, but one that has come to pass.

As a therapist, it is my deep desire to help my clients process their lives, unalone. Together we can discover how isolation has come to pass, and identify strategies for moving into a connected, and meaningful life. While I can't say what this will mean for every individual before I meet them I can assure you that, given time, we will figure it out together.

Green Team - Sustainable Christmas 2022



"God never gives someone a gift they are not capable of receiving, If He gives us the gift of Christmas, it is because we all have the ability to understand and receive it." - Pope Francis



Christmas is the season of giving and sharing, a faith filled time when we rejoice at the coming of Jesus into our world, over 2,000 years ago. With a little effort, planning and ingenuity, it can also be a time of sustainability, while we celebrate the season and care for the earth. Here are some tips for spreading joy without burdening the planet, from eartheasy.com and other sources.

Gift Giving: Think of ways to buy fewer new things. Have a family gift exchange where each person draws the name of a single person to receive a gift. Give an experience, like tickets to a theater or dance performance, a visit to a local museum or restaurant, or membership in a local institution. Shop thrift and antique stores for one-of-a-kind gifts that don't take new resource to make. Homemade baked goods and other edibles are always appreciated. Heifer International and other organizations allow contributors to "give" animals like rabbits, goats, heifers, llamas, and chickens to needy families, so they can feed themselves and earn extra income. Shop local craft fairs and artisans, to find unique gifts, without the transportation costs that contribute to global warming.

Home Decorating: Buy a live rather than a plastic tree. Live trees are a renewable resource, and can be recycled for mulch, while plastic trees are made from petroleum products and when discarded, live forever in the landfill. Plus, live trees smell like Christmas! Reduce the size of outdoor lightning displays and use LED strings, including solar LED lights that run off solar power. Turn off indoor and outdoor lights at bedtime, when no one is around to appreciate them.

Connecting with Nature: Establish the tradition of taking a Christmas bird count, walking a set route through your neighborhood with binoculars and notebook in hand, writing down the names and numbers of every bird seen. Over the years, you will have a record of your neighborhood birds. Even young kids can contribute to this activity. Decorate a tree with food for the birds such seed bells, suet, pine cones with peanut butter, and seed trays. Take a walk through your neighborhood or local park before the holiday meal, then talk about the walk during the meal.

Shopping Fair Trade: Chicago Fair Trade sponsors a holiday Pop-up Store where local vendors offer delicious food, sophisticated home goods, fashionable clothing, and toys; while supporting just wages for artisans, employment for groups at the margins, and environmental protections for everyone. This year the Pop-up Store is located at 1457 N Halsted Street at NewCity Mall. It is open from November 1 to December 24, Tuesday-Saturday from 11 am to 7 pm, and Sunday from 11 am to 6 pm (closed Mondays). Fair Trade gifts give twice, to the giver and the planet.

Meatless Mondays during the Holidays: You can sign up for seasonal recipes and inspiration at mondaycampaigns.org/meatless-monday/about Get an email every Monday with suggestions for meatless recipes for the holidays, including curried butternut squash soup, mushroom gravy, and pumpkin sage goat cheese lasagna. Impact the planet by going meatless on Mondays!



Saint Francesco Antonio Fasani

Saint of the Day for November 27, 2022

Saint Francesco Antonio Fasani's Story

Born in Lucera, Francesco entered the Conventual Franciscans in 1695. After his ordination 10 years later, he taught philosophy to younger friars, served as guardian of his friary, and later became provincial minister. When his term of office ended, Francesco became master of novices and finally pastor in his hometown.

In his various ministries, he was loving, devout, and penitential. He was a sought-after confessor and preacher. One witness at the canonical hearings regarding Francesco's holiness testified, "In his preaching he spoke in a familiar way, filled as he was with the love of God and neighbor; fired by the Spirit, he made use of the word and deed of holy Scripture, stirring his listeners and moving them to do penance." Francesco showed himself a loyal friend of the poor, never hesitating to seek from benefactors what was needed.

At his death in Lucera, children ran through the streets crying out, "The saint is dead! The saint is dead!" Francesco was canonized in 1986.

Reflection

Eventually we become what we choose. If we choose stinginess, we become stingy. If we choose compassion, we become compassionate. The holiness of Francesco Antonio Fasani resulted from his many small decisions to cooperate with God's grace.
