and Night Watch

An essential theme of John's Gospel is that Christ is life itself. In this, he is distinct from other living creatures, which are dependent on God for life. Jesus shares a unique intimacy with the Father, and the consequence of this pure love is pure and eternal life. Throughout John's Gospel, anyone who believes in Jesus and lives according to his example and teaching receives a share in this pure life. In this Sunday's Gospel reading, John shows his readers the power of Jesus' life even over death.

John does this first by proving that Lazarus is really dead. Jesus delays his trip to Judea. John's Gospel presents this as a pedagogical act. Jesus wants to make sure his disciples understand his power over death and its source in the Father (It's also likely that threats to Jesus's safety force him to delay). When Jesus does arrive, the mourning is underway and he himself weeps over his friend. As the tomb is opened, Martha fears the stench of death, and Lazarus, when he appears, is wrapped like a corpse in linens. Every one of these elements confirms that - no mistake - Lazarus is truly dead.

But when the voice of Life itself appears and calls Lazarus forth, death retreats in confusion. The unique life that Jesus shares with the Father is so abundant that Jesus can share it out like water from a spring. In the presence of such refulgent life-giving energy, death can make no further claims and Lazarus goes free.

On one level, John presents this miracle as the climax of Jesus' ministry. Starting with the Wedding at Cana, Jesus' miracles have grown in power so that now he can command mortality itself. On another level, John presents this narrative to foreshadow Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection, which is the result of the author of life being put to death.

Living out this Gospel in our own discipleship requires more than generic belief in the resurrection. It requires faith in Christ's power over all forms of death: illness, hopelessness, fear, violence, poverty, alienation. These "little deaths" sap human life even as we continue to live. We disciples, plunged into Jesus' life through baptism, have a responsibility to confront death wherever we find it. We do this by believing in Christ even when such faith seems absurd. We do this through works of mercy and kindness, through the establishment of kinship, through the inspiration of hope. Most radically, we overcome death through love, the essence of Jesus' relationship with the Father and the source of their unique life. Every time our faith inspires another's freedom, we stand at the door of a tomb, and with Christ's own voice shout, "Come forth!"

In engaging in these dialogues with the Gospel and each other, we hope to surface new insights to help deepen our faith, as well as to identify new actions that will enliven and build up community among us.

# Would You Be Willing To Share Your Thoughts With Us?





# Immigrant and Refugee Ministry



### **Fifth Sunday of Lent**

Station 1: Jesus is condemned.

Today's Gospel tells of Jesus raising Lazarus, a foreshadowing of God's power over death.

Such faith and hope carry Jesus through these next weeks. Reflect on the faith and hope that carry migrants on their journeys.

### Monday.

Station 2: Jesus accepts his cross. Pray for immigrants who are denied a fair trial, and migrant children who sit in court alone. Support those who defend them as Jesus defended the adulterous woman.

### **Thursday**

Station 5: Simon helps Jesus carry the cross. In Today's Gospel Jesus challenges those in power, just as DACA and Asylum seekers Reflect on how you can be like Simon and take up their cross.

Station 6: Veronica wipes the face of Jesus.

The Gospel shows how Jesus is still threatened by unbelieving people.

# THE IMMIGRANT & REFUGEE MINISTRY (IRM) IS SEEKING AN AFFORDABLE 2 BR APARTMENT FOR AN INCOMING FAMILY

Finding affordable housing is a real challenge for resettling immigrant families. If you—or someone you know—has a nice 2 BR apartment available for rent in the Chicago area in the next few months, IRM would like to connect with you. IRM will accompany this asylum seeking or refugee family and provide personal assistance and support to the family, i.e., finding a job, registering children for school, etc. The apartment will ideally be located near public transportation and be under \$1,500 monthly. Renting to this family will be an important element in launching them successfully.

# CATHOLIC CHARITIES TO LAUNCH A NEW ARCHDIOCESAN ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR ASYLUM SEEKERS IN LATE MARCH

IRM has worked with Catholic Charities to develop a program to serve asylum seekers bussed into the Chicago area from Texas. A number of Archdiocesan parishes have shown an interest with 11 already signing on. The goal is to engage 21 in this Parish Sponsorship Model. Parishes have the option of covering the cost of financially supporting a family of asylum seekers (\$10,000), accompanying them, or both. Catholic Charities will provide the case management support for the families and are still figuring out options for housing and legal support for this program.





### Saint Catherine of Genoa

Saint of the Day for March 26, 2023

Going to confession one day was the turning point of Catherine's life.

When Catherine was born, many Italian nobles were supporting Renaissance artists and writers. The needs of the poor and the sick were often overshadowed by a hunger for luxury and self-indulgence. Catherine's parents were members of the nobility in Genoa. At 13, she attempted to become a nun but failed because of her age. At 16, she married Julian, a nobleman who turned out to be selfish and unfaithful. For a while she tried to numb her disappointment by a life of selfish pleasure.

One day in confession she had a new sense of her own sins and how much God loved her. She reformed her life and gave good example to Julian, who soon turned from his self-centered life of distraction. Julian's spending, however, had ruined them financially. He and Catherine decided to live in the Pammatone, a large hospital in Genoa, and to dedicate themselves to works of charity there. After Julian's death in 1497, Catherine took over management of the hospital.

She wrote about purgatory which, she said, begins on earth for souls open to God. Life with God in heaven is a continuation and perfection of the life with God begun on earth.

Exhausted by her life of self-sacrifice, Catherine died September 15, 1510, and was canonized in 1737. The liturgical feast of Saint Catherine of Genoa is celebrated on September 15.

Regular confession and frequent Communion can help us see the direction—or drift—of our life with God. People who have a realistic sense of their own sinfulness and of the greatness of God are often the ones who are most ready to meet the needs of their neighbors. Saint Catherine began her hospital work with enthusiasm and was faithful to it through difficult times because she was inspired by the love of God, a love which was renewed in her by the Scriptures and the sacraments.
