# Where Do I Line Up?

In the part of our country where the soil is more familiar with corn stalks and soybeans, in a time when pageantry requires pyrotechnics and lasers, I'm standing inside church holding a palm frond and imagining myself at a procession that took place two thousand years ago. With this blending of the solemn and the playful, with this exercise of religious imagination, there can be no mistake. It is Palm Sunday and I need to line up for a procession.

Palm Sunday is one of those rare days when everyone who comes to church is asked to participate in a symbolic re-enactment of the Gospel reading. Waving palms, we are invited to take on the role of the crowd that greets and walks in procession with Jesus into the holy city of Jerusalem. Clearly, this is something different. Why this focus on a procession?

In their book, The Last Week, Scripture scholars Marcus J. Borg and John Dominic Crossan, add an interesting insight into the events we mark on Palm Sunday.

"Two processions entered Jerusalem on a spring day in the year 30. It was the beginning of the week of Passover, the most sacred week of the Jewish year.

One was a peasant procession, the other an imperial procession. From the east, Jesus rode a donkey down the Mount of Olives cheered by his followers. Jesus was from the peasant village of Nazareth, his message was about the kingdom of God, and his followers came from the peasant class. They had journeyed to Jerusalem from Galilee, about a hundred miles to the north...

On the opposite side of the city, from the west, Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor of Idumea, Judea, and Samaria, entered Jerusalem at the head of a column of imperial cavalry and soldiers. Jesus's procession proclaimed the kingdom of God; Pilate's proclaimed the power of empire.

The two processions embody the central conflict of the week that led to Jesus's crucifixion.

Pilate's military procession was a demonstration of both Roman imperial power and Roman imperial theology. Though unfamiliar to most people today, the imperial procession was well known in the Jewish homeland in the first century. It was the standard practice of the Roman governors of Judea to be in Jerusalem for the major Jewish festivals. They did so not out of empathetic reverence for the religious devotion of their Jewish subjects, but to be in the city in case there was trouble. There often was, especially at Passover, a festival that celebrated the Jewish people's liberation from an earlier empire.

The mission of the troops with Pilate was to reinforce the Roman garrison permanently stationed in the Fortress Antonia overlooking the Jewish temple and its courts. They and Pilate had come up from Caesarea Maritima, "Caesarea on the Sea," about sixty miles to the west. Like the Roman governors of Judea and Samaria before and after him, Pilate lived in the new and splendid city on the coast. But for the major Jewish festivals, Pilate, like his predecessors and successors, went to Jerusalem.

Pilate's procession displayed not only imperial power, but also Roman imperial theology. According to this theology, the emperor was not simply the ruler of Rome, but the Son of God.... His successors continued to bear divine titles, including Tiberius, emperor during the time of Jesus' public activity. For Rome's Jewish subjects, Pilate's procession embodied not only a rival social order, but a rival theology."

This awareness of the imperial procession is helpful to me because it provides a fuller context for the Palm Sunday procession. Held up side by side are two understandings of power and two understandings of what it means to be a child of God.

We see imperial power characterized by the drive to dominate and exploit. Imperial theology entitles the "Son of God" to exemption from all manner of suffering while ensuring all manner of privilege. The imperial procession is nothing if not a visible display of the full assent given to the very temptations Jesus endured and rejected in the desert, i.e., the temptations of exemption (you needn't be hungry), privilege (angels will protect you), and domination (all the kingdoms of the world can be yours).

Jesus's procession speaks to the kingdom of God and a social order characterized by compassion, inclusion, and mercy. Pilate's procession speaks to the power of empire and a social order characterized by authoritarianism, domination, and oppression.

There were and always are two processions. Perhaps we need Palm Sunday to remember where to line up.


# OLD ST PATRICK'S BOOK CLUB



# GREEN NOTES FROM OSP GREEN TEAM: THE ISSUE WITH TISSUE



"When we are in a forest among the trees, we're with our ancestors, our elder relatives. The trees are talking to us. The question is, are we listening?"

Dave Porter, Kaska First Nation Elder



Since 2019, the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC) has issued a scorecard ranking the sustainability of consumer tissue products (toilet paper, paper towels, facial tissue). Their goal is to highlight a little-known connection between these products and the destruction of boreal forests. The boreal forest is the northernmost and coldest forest on earth, covering vast tracts in Alaska, Canada, Russia, Scandinavia, and northeastern China, extending into parts of far northern United States in Idaho, Montana, and Minnesota. The trees in boreal forests are the conifers spruce, fir, pine, and the deciduous conifer larch, as well as the deciduous trees birch and aspen. This forest is characterized by long cold winters and short growing seasons, only 50-130 days long. Because of the frigid climate, trees are typically short, in some cases only 15 to 20 feet tall. But the boreal forest supports wildlife seen nowhere else, including woodland caribou, marten, lynx, and moose, and many species of migrating birds, that summer and raise their young in the far north. And it is the home of 600 communities of indigenous people in Canada, whose culture is intimately tied up with ecosystems where they live.

So, what is the connection between boreal forests and tissue products? Many companies, including many American companies, are now clearcutting this forest, especially in Canada, at alarming rates to produce toilet paper, paper towels, and facial tissue. Canada is now third behind Brazil and Russia in loss of forest acreage, and accounts for 15% of all intact worldwide forest loss between 2000 and 2013. Between 1996 and 2015, Canada lost 28 million acres of virgin boreal forest to clear cutting, an area equivalent in size to the state of Ohio. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) notes that preserving forests worldwide is essential to avoiding catastrophic effects from climate change, and is critical to maintaining biodiversity and resilience in our climate altered world. The NRDC argues that we have created a tree to toilet pipeline by the industrial clear cutting of virgin boreal forests in Canada.

Consumers can be part of the solution to our issues with tissue, through their buying choices.

- Become from familiar with NRDC's rating of tissue products, and, when feasible, select products with A or B ratings. See https://www.nrdc.org/sites/default/files/issue-with-tissue-2022-scorecard.pdf
- Look for tissue products made from 100% recycled content, which use ½ the water, release 1/3 greenhouse gases and ½ the air pollutants, and need no bleaching, compared to virgin pulp.
- Look for Forest Service Council (FSC) Certification on tissue products you buy. This certification helps ensure that forest harvests promote biodiversity and conservation, and support indigenous voices.
- Choose tissue products made from alternative sources of pulp like bamboo and wheat straw.

How amazing that the simple act of purchasing home tissue products can be part of preventing species loss, avoiding climate change, and practicing sustainability! Let's do it!





## Saint Francis of Paola

Saint of the Day for April 2, 2023

Francis of Paola was a man who deeply loved contemplative solitude and wished only to be the "least in the household of God." Yet, when the Church called him to active service in the world, he became a miracle-worker and influenced the course of nations.

After accompanying his parents on a pilgrimage to Rome and Assisi, he began to live as a contemplative hermit in a remote cave near Paola, on Italy's southern seacoast. Before he was 20, he received the first followers who had come to imitate his way of life. Seventeen years later, when his disciples had grown in number, Francis established a Rule for his austere community and sought Church approval. This was the founding of the Hermits of St. Francis of Assisi, who were approved by the Holy See in 1474.

In 1492, Francis changed the name of his community to "Minims" because he wanted them to be known as the least (minimi) in the household of God. Humility was to be the hallmark of the brothers as it had been in Francis's personal life. Besides the vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, Francis enjoined upon his followers the fourth obligation of a perpetual Lenten fast. He felt that heroic mortification was necessary as a means for spiritual growth.

It was Francis's desire to be a contemplative hermit, yet he believed that God was calling him to the apostolic life. He began to use the gifts he had received, such as the gifts of miracles and prophecy, to minister to the people of God. A defender of the poor and oppressed, Francis incurred the wrath of King Ferdinand of Naples for the admonitions he directed toward the king and his sons.

Following the request of Pope Sixtus IV, Francis traveled to Paris to help Louis XI of France prepare for his death. While ministering to the king, Francis was able to influence the course of national politics. He helped to restore peace between France and Brittany by advising a marriage between the ruling families, and between France and Spain by persuading Louis XI to return some disputed land.

Francis died while at the French court.

Saint Francis of Paola is a Patron Saint of Sailors.
