

Encounter, Proximity & Witness: Planting Seeds of Racial Justice By Maureen Hellwig



I'm proudly engaged in the Racial Equity and Justice Initiative (REJI) and the North Lawndale Kinship Initiative here at Old St. Pat's. Each is a part of the more current context for my anti-racism educational experience, but there were a number of early and formative experiences in my life that actually started me on my path. So, I hope you will indulge me with a little personal storytelling. I grew up in the 1950s in the very white Lincoln Square neighborhood on the city's north side. Little chance of ever meeting a Black person there. Typically, the church I attended never talked about racism or race relations. No surprise here. As Fr. Bryan Massingale points out in his book, Racial Justice and the Catholic Church, "The most notable fact concerning the Catholic theological contribution to racial reconciliation is its absence." But then, I encountered the Catholic exception.

I did not meet a Black person until I attended Alvernia High School, also located in the very white northwest side. It was staffed by the School Sisters of St. Francis. It was there, in 1959, that I met Beverly, Margaret, and Hazel, Black girls from the south side who were welcome at Alvernia. And there were black sisters, Maria Crucis, Lourene Holly, and Michael Mary. So, step one -- personal encounter. Step two involves gaining proximity to the issues experienced by those we encounter. For me, this context came through entering Black space and witnessing the White adults in my life, attempting to be allies and fighting against racial injustice and discrimination.

My entry into Black space was fostered by my sociology teacher at Alvernia, Sister Angelica (now Ann Seng). She encouraged us to volunteer at places like Friendship House, then at 42nd & Indiana. As I took public transportation there, I needed to walk from the subway station to Friendship House. I had my first experience of feeling "racially out of place," as I saw no other white people during my walk. I was not smart enough at the time to make the connection with what must have been a similar experience on the part of black people, who might have had a similar experience when they went to a first job in a predominantly white world. The volunteer work usually involved just helping with a mailing – folding, stuffing and stamping — under the direction of the African American staff. They were in charge. This was another new experience that made it more and more natural to me over time.

Also, while I was still in high school, in the summer of 1962, I had another aha moment. I opened the newspaper one morning to find a photo on page 3 that caught my immediate attention. There was Sister Angelica, along with 3 other white sisters from Alvernia, and sisters from other orders, walking a picket line in front of Lewis Towers, a building on the downtown campus of Loyola University. They were protesting the discrimination practiced by the Chicago Catholic Women's organization that would not allow Black people to use the pool they supervised inside that building. As summer school students at the university, they made a decision that they could not stand silently by, knowing this was going on in the same building where they attended classes. Well, they could have, but they did not. The reaction of Cardinal Cody was swift and negative; the leadership of the School Sisters of St. Francis was supportive of their Sisters in their stance for social justice. My reaction was Wow! Seeing shapes believing.

Witness! That was what I was seeing and learning from. If you say something about injustice, it follows you must do something about injustice. Certainly, this is the motivation behind Old St. Pat's Racial Equity and Justice Initiative (REJI) and the North Lawndale Kinship Initiative. Putting the word "equity" in our OSP initiative is intentional. Real equity goes beyond equal opportunity and requires the achievement of equitable outcomes – actual changes in policies, practices, attitudes and actions. It is definitely a work in progress, and a long and winding road. We are blessed, but we are also called. The Gospel call is not ambiguous: Blessed are the poor! Love your neighbor! No exceptions were put forth by our anti-racist leader, Jesus Christ, who embraced the Samaritans his own friends and neighbors rejected. Let us be witnesses that we got the message.

Wherever you are on this journey, embrace your encounter with the unfamiliar, seek understanding, listen for the call, and make witness your answer.



In the late 1980's, the late Mrs. Maggie Daley and Fr. Jack Wall, Pastor at Old St. Patrick's Church, discussed the idea of founding a new Catholic School. In 1989, their dream became a reality as they opened St. Patrick's School, now called The Frances Xavier Warde School.

Around the same time, they founded an organization to support the socio-economic diversity FXW was committed to enrolling, and in 1990 The Children at the Crossroads Foundation (CATC) was created on the belief that economic circumstances should not preclude an eager and capable child from receiving a quality education. The Foundation seeks to enrich our community by significantly improving the academic achievement, self-esteem and life opportunities of schoolchildren by offering need-based scholarship support to students attending The Frances Xavier Warde School (FXW). Each spring, Old St. Patrick's Church and Holy Name Cathedral partner with CATC for Scholarship Sunday.

CATC and FXW are grateful for our longstanding partnership of more than three decades with Old St. Patrick's Church. The generosity of the OSP members plays an integral role in supporting the hundreds of current students receiving assistance. Over 200 students attending FXW receive some form of tuition assistance, and 100% of the students and faculty benefit from the socioeconomic diversity the School has to offer. Your support is an affirmation that you believe, like we do, that we can form the faith of the next generation and send them onward to create an impact in our city, country, and the world.

Attracting students from over 60 zip codes, CATC provides multi-year scholarships for students to attend FXW. In this environment, children experience an exceptional education, rooted in faith, service, diversity and inclusion. Thanks to CATC and FXW, students matriculate to the finest high schools and colleges in the country. Since its inception, CATC has awarded over \$17 million to more than a thousand scholarship recipients.

HealingTogether@Home, A Grief Support Group

Because we are not meeting in person for our regular grief support group, Companions on the Journey, we have created a grief support group that meets remotely utilizing the Zoom meeting platform. HealingTogether@Home, has been organized for those who are grieving the death of a loved one: parent, spouse, significant other, sibling, family member, extended family member, friend... It hurts!

You may be experiencing some of the most powerful and painful feelings of your life. The many feelings of grief may seem uncomfortable and threatening to you. And, sadly, there are too few people who want to talk to you about this pain.

Support in dealing with the grief experience is a valuable way of helping yourself or someone you know. Support groups often provide an opportunity for grieving persons to better understand the wide range of feelings and behaviors associated with grief. More importantly, support groups offer a safe place where people can come together for mutual support, to learn that their feelings are normal, and that one need not be alone.

Our program is offered over the course of six consecutive weeks. Our groups are small by design so that they are comfortable and informal. Our next group is scheduled to begin on Thursday, May 11th.







GREEN NOTES FROM OSP GREEN TEAM: HOW TO UP YOUR RECYCLING GAME

"Recyclables are collected locally, but impacted globally." County of Arlington Virginia

More people in the US are recycling now than ever before, but we still have a way to go. In 1960, about 7% of consumer waste was recycled; by 2015, that percent had increased to 34%. Recycling varies by product; about 9% of plastics, 20% of glass, and 50% of metals are recycled. Recycling matters because making products out of recycled material is efficient; it also lowers reliance on extractive industries like mining. Making products out of recycled material saves energy; for example, we can produce a recycled aluminum soda can for about 5% of the cost of a can made of new aluminum. Recycling also reduces what has to go into the landfill, prevents wildlife from being tangled up in plastic waste, and creates jobs for people in the recycling industry.



Knowing how to recycle is important. In our economy, with many product and packaging options, recycling has to be sorted to avoid contaminating materials at the recycling center. Here are some sources for tips to help you recycle with confidence.

- How2Recycle is a standardized labelling system that gives clear recycling instructions to the public. It tells you if an item can be recycled in your municipal cart; needs to be dropped-off at the store; can only be recycled in a few places; or cannot be recycled at all now. It also tells you what you need to do before recycling an item: for example, empty and replace cap. Look for this label on products you purchase and follow the instructions for faultless recycling. Visit *how2recycle.info* for more information.
- Wonder what to do with oddball items like left over latex paint from that repainting project, or old lithium batteries from a camera you no longer
 use? Earth911 tells you about nearby options for recycling these and similar specialized products. Earth911 maintains one of the world's largest
 databases on recycling, with data on over 350 different materials and 100,000 recycling locations, all organized by zip code. Use it to figure out
 how to recycle items you purchase infrequently. Visit <u>earth911.com</u> for more information.
- It's important to recognize materials that cannot be recycled under our current system. Including these items in your cart can gum up the line at the recycling center and even cause contaminated materials to be rejected to the landfill. The non-profit GreenBlue has a list of 18 items that cannot be recycled in your municipal cart. One item that may surprise you: flexible packaging that can be balled up (think pouches, granola bar wrappers, and potato chip bags), usually cannot be recycled. This type of packaging is multilayered, with paper, metallics and plastic combined, making it not a candidate for normal paper and plastic recycling streams. Visit *greenblue.org* for more information.

By recycling, we give materials a second life. And sometimes a third and a fourth life: aluminum cans can be recycled almost infinitely, using just a fraction of the new materials as cans from freshly mined aluminum. In this season of renewal and new growth, let's become recycling pros, a small but important step in caring for our common home.








CONTEMPLATION ON DIVINE LOVE: AN IGNATIAN DAY OF RETREAT

Saint George

Saint of the Day for April 23, 2023

Saint George is the object of a vast amount of imagination. There is every reason to believe that he was a real martyr who suffered at Lydda in Palestine, probably before the time of Constantine. The Church adheres to his memory, but not to the legends surrounding his life. That he was willing to pay the supreme price to follow Christ is what the Church believes. And it is enough.

The story of George's slaying the dragon, rescuing the king's daughter, and converting Libya is a 12th-century Italian fable. George was a favorite patron saint of crusaders, as well as of Eastern soldiers in earlier times. He is a patron saint of England, Portugal, Germany, Aragon, Catalonia, Genoa, Milan and Bologna.

Human nature seems to crave more than cold historical data. Americans have Washington and Lincoln, but we somehow need Paul Bunyan, too. The life of Saint Francis of Assisi is inspiring enough, but for centuries the Italians have found his spirit in the legends of the Fioretti, too. Santa Claus is the popular extension of the spirit of Saint Nicholas. The legends about Saint George are part of this yearning. Both fact and legend are human ways of illumining the mysterious truth about the One who alone is holy.
