

SNAPSHOTS AND THE MESSY WHOLE



All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their property and possessions and divide them among all according to each one's need. Every day they devoted themselves to meeting together in the Temple area and to breaking bread in their homes.

But if you are like me, it is easy to look around at our own situations and wonder, "What went so horribly wrong?!" In my imagination, I see the meme that went viral in 2019/2020. For our purposes, this format helps juxtapose the optimistic beginnings with its (often comical) disastrous current state. For example:



The truth is that the beautiful image in the Acts of the Apostles - the image of togetherness and commonality, faithfulness and sincerity of heart - was a snapshot, not the entirety of the truth of the early church. To be clear, I believe the Acts of the Apostles to be, like the rest of our sacred scripture, part of God's divine revelation. But as I get older, I am more and more aware that holding up a snapshot as if it was a synthesis rarely serves us.

Further into Acts of the Apostles, we learn about accusations of unfairness between the different groups of believers and we learn of controversies so profound that the community is about to be torn in two. We see Paul - the great Apostle to the Gentiles - split from his Barnabas due to unresolved resentment he held toward John Mark, a kinsman and assistant of Barnabas disciple.


Snapshots are REAL, but they are not the whole truth. Granted, snapshots are sometimes more preferred because we find it hard to grasp the whole truth. The truth is usually big and messy, slippery and heavy, and ... mysterious. So perhaps we need to recommit ourselves to holding *both*: the individual experiences and the mysterious, larger truths of which they are a part.

So when this church of ours lets us down, when its words pierce the hearts of our siblings, when its factions seem to reveal animosity rather than *togetherness* ... may we remember the through-line of the Holy Spirit, who is relentless in its work and expansive in its scope. For, I think the Acts of the Apostles was, and continues to be, essentially about the *acts of the Holy Spirit*: that same Spirit whom so many of us have known and *felt* in the midst of our communities. And that Spirit seems to be just as eager for partners in its work now as it was in the first centuries of the church.

So I add my voice to the chorus through the ages:

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit, and they shall be created. And you shall renew the face of the earth.

"LOOKING BACK ON THE LAST FOUR YEARS" A Reflection by Daniel Vondruska, Foundations Class of 2023

Foundations is one of the greatest things that has ever happened to me in my entire life. Back when I was in middle school I noticed that my brother was going on week long summer trips and he would always come back with a mohawk. It was great because I got my room to myself for an entire week, little did I know that in a few years I would be doing the exact same thing. I started out at Blueprints in 8th grade. Back then, I didn't think much of it because I really just saw it as something I would go to for an hour after church. I didn't care for it and I didn't invest any significant time or feelings into blueprints.

All of that would change on my first worktour in the summer of 2021. I wasn't able to go my sophomore year in 2020 because of the pandemic shutting everything down. Not like anyone wants to remember that anyway. My first worktour going into my junior year was in Wheeling, West Virginia, a low income city whose residents were in need of a helping hand. Around the time I was on this worktour I had a lot going on in my life and I just wasn't there mentally and I totally wasn't into it at all.

Once we got there, things started to turn around for me, people got to know each other pretty fast and we all became close extremely quickly. Everything flipped on its head on Thursday night, our 2nd to last day on the trip, this was the night where we were all able to sit in a circle for hours and talk about the things that have been holding us back in life. We were there until about 1AM, and it ended with everyone hugging and crying. It was incredible, especially because seniors like Jack Kendrick, Jonas Dargis, Alyssa Mullally and Claire Corrigan were extremely nice and super supportive, they got everyone to talk to each other, break the ice and were the whole reason the worktour worked.

Fast forward one year and I was going on my 2022 worktour before my senior year. We went to Memphis, Tennessee to help the local community thrive, mainly the children that are left at a daycare/mini-school while their parents work. We played with them all day in the 100+ degree heat for 5 days straight. On this trip, I found myself in the same role as the seniors on my worktour last year. I was the ringleader for the boys, I kept them in line and made sure they weren't too rowdy. But also let them have fun...maybe too much fun. A lot of the younger people on that trip told me that they thought of me as an older brother figure, which made me the happiest I've been in a long time.

To me, Foundations was a second chance at high school. A chance for someone that didn't get to connect with many people at their school to finally let loose with people just like them. If you're about to join Foundations or are already in Foundations, I implore you, from the bottom of my heart, go on a worktour, it doesn't matter who you know and who you don't, they'll all be closer than family by the time you get home. Go on, dive in, have fun. Thank you!







HealingTogether@Home, A Grief Support Group

Because we are not meeting in person for our regular grief support group, Companions on the Journey, we have created a grief support group that meets remotely utilizing the Zoom meeting platform. HealingTogether@Home, has been organized for those who are grieving the death of a loved one: parent, spouse, significant other, sibling, family member, extended family member, friend... It hurts!

You may be experiencing some of the most powerful and painful feelings of your life. The many feelings of grief may seem uncomfortable and threatening to you. And, sadly, there are too few people who want to talk to you about this pain. Support in dealing with the grief experience is a valuable way of helping yourself or someone you know. Support groups often provide an opportunity for grieving persons to better understand the wide range of feelings and behaviors associated with grief. More importantly, support groups offer a safe place where people can come together for mutual support, to learn that their feelings are normal, and that one need not be alone.

Our program is offered over the course of six consecutive weeks. Our groups are small by design so that they are comfortable and informal. **Our next** group is scheduled to begin on Thursday, May 11th. We know the path on which you are walking because we have walked it as well. Our prayers are with you...



Saint Rose Venerini

Saint of the Day for May 7, 2023

Rose was born at Viterbo in Italy, the daughter of a doctor. Following the death of her fiancé she entered a convent, but soon returned home to care for her newly widowed mother. Meanwhile, Rose invited the women of the neighborhood to recite the rosary in her home, forming a sort of sodality with them.

As she looked to her future under the spiritual guidance of a Jesuit priest, Rose became convinced that she was called to become a teacher in the world rather than a contemplative nun in a convent. Clearly, she made the right choice: She was a born teacher, and the free school for girls she opened in 1685 was well received.

Soon the cardinal invited her to oversee the training of teachers and the administration of schools in his diocese of Montefiascone. As Rose's reputation grew, she was called upon to organize schools in many parts of Italy, including Rome. Her disposition was right for the task as well, for Rose often met considerable opposition but was never deterred.

She died in Rome in 1728, where a number of miracles were attributed to her. She was beatified in 1952 and canonized in 2006. The sodality, or group of women she had invited to prayer, was ultimately given the rank of a religious congregation. Today, the so-called Venerini Sisters can be found in the United States and elsewhere, working among Italian immigrants.

Whatever state of life God calls us to, we bring with us an assortment of experiences, interests and gifts however small they seem to us. Rose's life stands as a reminder that all we are is meant to be put to service wherever we find ourselves.
