# WALKING ON THE SAME ROAD... TOGETHER By Keara Ette Director of Ministries



I have been feeling excitement in the air. Well, I'm also feeling heat and humidity to levels we haven't otherwise seen this summer in Chicago. But in many areas of the world-wide Catholic Church, there seems to be a feeling of excitement. Admittedly, for some Catholics who are aware of things happening in the global church, the feeling might be more one of confusion, of apathy, or even fear and suspicion. But at least for this life-long Catholic, it feels very clear that *something* is happening, and that something feels energizing.

And it is doubtful that Pope Francis spent years laying the groundwork, launching a process to be undertaken by the Catholic church around the world, and finally calling forth ministers, teachers, and members of the Church to meet in Rome for a month-long *Synod* in October of this year, all so that I could feel re-energized, the truth is the same. But it is likely that most of us Catholics (including the bishops, cardinals, and lay and religious clerical leaders around the world) have many questions about exactly what this "Synod on Synodality" is and what will come from it.

So over the course of the next month, the staff and leaders of Old St. Pat's will prepare for and grow in understanding of this Synod (<a href="https://www.synod.va/en.html">https://www.synod.va/en.html</a>) by offering bulletin articles, podcasts, interviews, prayers, and conversations that will help us learn more about the concept, the objectives, and the structure of this important event and work in the Catholic Church. During the month of October, our community will pray for and with our siblings in Christ as they gather for the Synod, and we will also deepen our own practices of this way of being and doing church together.

Let's use as our launching point, the words of Pope Francis back in 2021 as he preached at the Mass which formally began the Synodal Process, the first stages of which took place in every diocese around the world.

A certain rich man came up to Jesus "as he was setting out on his journey" (Mk 10:17). The Gospels frequently show us Jesus "on a journey"; ... He shows us that God is not found in neat and orderly places, distant from reality, but walks ever at our side. He meets us where we are, on the often rocky roads of life.

Celebrating a Synod means walking on the same road, walking together. Let us look at Jesus. First, he *encounters* the rich man on the road; he then *listens* to his questions, and finally he helps him *discern* what he must do to inherit eternal life. *Encounter*, *listen* and *discern*.

This is the *synodal path*: the work of encountering, listening, and discerning so that the Holy Spirit might guide the church, at all of its levels and in all of its iterations, toward the path set out for us: a path that might contribute to mutual healing and transformation. Over the coming weeks, we will hear from teachers, leaders, and fellow Old St. Pat's members about the synodal path, what has already taken place at the parish, diocese, and national levels around the world, and the issues that the People of God have identified and held up as needing attention and prayerful conversation and discernment. We hope you will join us for this journey, and please visit *oldstpats.org/synod* to find resources for this journey.









# Why "synod?"

In its technical sense a synod is a gathering of church leaders to discuss matters of faith or church practice. There have been many such gatherings in the history of the Church. The word literally means "journeying together" (from the Greek word synodía), to indicate that this process should always be done in the company of others and never alone.

"The Church is exploring a new way of being Church to equip our local churches to live together in communion, achieve greater participation, and move forward more intentionally in our mission in and throughout the world. This Synod is an invitation to engage with those on the margins of our Church and society, an opportunity to encounter those who may disagree with us or think differently than us. Everyone's voice and experience are vital to the path we are asked to walk together throughout this process.

This time of listening and dialogue is an invitation to adopt an orientation of welcome and understanding, to return to our mission, and build communion. As we do so we can both strengthen our faith and remain true to our teachings while deepening our relationships with all the People of God.

This synod is an invitation to really listen to the lived experiences of the whole of the People of God and discern, together, where the Spirit is calling us as a Church. This may not always be a straightforward process and does not have any set outcomes or intended benchmarks."

# Pope Francis' Speech to the Delegation for the Presentation of the 'E Giornalismo' Prize (8/26/23)

Last weekend, Pope Francis met with a group of Italian journalists and shared with them his hopes for the Church's Synod as hundreds of lay leaders, priests, religious, and bishops gather in Rome from around the world in October. In his comments, we find not only an explanation of what Pope Francis means by a synodal process, but we also see what the Pope believes are the origins and vision for this Synod on Synodality.

#### Synod (noun): making a way together, walking a path together syn + hodos = 'with' + 'path'

"The hope is this: that today, in a time in which everyone seems to comment on everything, even regardless of the facts and often even before being informed, we rediscover and return to cultivating more the principle of reality - reality is superior to the idea, always -: the reality of facts, the dynamism of facts; which are never static and always evolve, towards good or evil, so as not to run the risk of the information society turning into the disinformation society.

To do this, however, we need to spread a culture of encounter, a culture of dialogue, a culture of listening to the other and his or her reasons. Digital culture has brought us so many new possibilities for exchange, but it also risks turning communication into slogans. No, communication is always back and forth. I speak, I listen, and I respond, but always dialogue. It is not a slogan. I am concerned, for example, about the manipulations of those who interestingly propagate fake news to steer public opinion. Please, let us not give in to the logic of opposition, let us not be influenced by the language of hatred.

And now I come to the request for help. Precisely at this time, when there is much talk and little listening, and when the sense of the common good is in danger of weakening, the Church as a whole has embarked on a journey to rediscover the word together. We must rediscover the word together. Walk together. Question together. Take responsibility together for community discernment, which for us is prayer, as the first Apostles did: this is synodality, which we would like to make a daily habit in all its expressions. Precisely for this purpose, in just over a month, bishops and lay people from all over the world will meet here in Rome for a Synod on synodality: listening together, discerning together, praying together. The word together is very important. We are in a culture of exclusion, which is a kind of communication capitalism.

I am well aware that speaking of a "Synod on Synodality" may seem something abstruse, selfreferential, excessively technical, of little interest to the general public. But what has happened over the past year, which will continue with the assembly next October and then with the second stage of Synod 2024, is something truly important for the Church. It is a journey that Saint Paul VI began at the end of the Council, when he created the Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops, because he had realized that in the Western Church synodality had disappeared, whereas in the Eastern Church they have this dimension. And this years-long journey - 60 years - is bearing great fruit. Please, let us get used to listening to each other, to talking, not cutting our heads off for a word. To listen, to discuss in a mature way. This is a grace we all need in order to move forward. And it is something the Church today offers the world, a world so often so incapable of making decisions, even when our very survival is at stake. We are trying to learn a new way of living relationships, listening to one another to hear and follow the voice of the Spirit. We have opened our doors, we have offered everyone the opportunity to participate, we have taken into account everyone's needs and suggestions. We want to contribute together to build the Church where everyone feels at home, where no-one is excluded. That word of the Gospel that is so important: everyone. Everyone, everyone: there are no first-, second- or third-class Catholics, no. All together. Everyone. It is the Lord's invitation."

#### THE SEASON OF CREATION BEGINS: LET JUSTICE AND PEACE FLOW

The Season is Creation is a time when churches of many denominations focus on faith-based responses to the environmental crisis. The Season begins each year on September 1, the World Day of Prayer for creation, and ends on October 4, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, beloved in many faiths as the patron saint of ecology. Each year, a Steering Committee composed of representatives of several religious groups creates a theme for the Season of Creation. This year's theme, "Let Justice and Peace Flow," recognizes the vital part water plays in sustaining life in all its forms on earth, and

acknowledges that the environmental crisis is also a crisis of justice, based on the unequal burden placed on some parts of the world.

Pope Francis writes movingly about these issues in his letter addressing the 2023 Season of Creation. Acknowledging the theme of this year's season, he calls for us to harmonize our own rhythms with those of creation, so that the heartbeat of Creation matches the heartbeat of God. He asks us to stand with the victims of environmental and climate justice, in opposition to predatory industries, like those involved with fracking, mega-mining projects, and intensive animal farming.

The Pope urges us to make three changes in response to the Season of Creation. First, to transform our hearts in four areas: in relation to God, other human beings, nature, and ourselves. Second, to transform our lifestyles, so we live with moderation and joyful sobriety, following practices like consistent recycling and making sustainable choices about the products and services we use. Third, to transform public policies, so we bring an end to the era of fossil fuels, and develop ways to pay back the ecological debt richer nations owe to the rest of the world.

Acting with urgency now means we will not miss our chance to create a more sustainable just world, as the United Nations has acknowledged. In doing so, we acknowledge our faith that nature is an inexhaustible gift, and our common home a great cathedral, worthy of our veneration and devotion.

# Coming back from Portugal...

"Most of my feelings about the trip can be gleaned from this single sentence: Our small but mighty crew was among 1.5 million pilgrims from every corner of the world!

1.5 million young people cared enough about their faith and our Church to travel to a foreign land and share their faith with strangers. It felt like the opposite of our online-focused world; everyone was genuinely trying to meet friends from distant lands and find connection. The sheer number of attendees and their warm, open disposition gave me immense hope for the future of our faith.


Every hour we encountered fellow pilgrims from all over the world. Everyone was so joyful - inviting anyone around them to sing and dance, regardless of language barrier. I felt like I got a glimpse of the true global church, and she was wildly beautiful!

We were all pilgrims! This was a word I hadn't really associated with myself, but yes, I went to Portugal really seeking the Holy Spirit, yearning for an encounter with God. This has felt like a particularly chaotic year for me, and OSP gave me the opportunity to take a forced pause. I had never been to a WYD before, had no idea what to expect, but went trusting the Spirit would bring me whatever I might need. I am so grateful for this gift.

Our crew was small but mighty - I barely knew anyone in our group beforehand, but we shared such a beautiful experience in one week together and really looked after one another during the process. Shoutout to Young Adult Minister Brenda Chavez for building and guiding such a great group!



The mantra I want to carry most and share from this trip is this: Amidst the chaos of life, remember to pause and look up - Jesus is always there. In Lisbon, He was everywhere. Thank you so much to everyone who helped make this trip possible. I'm supposed to be aged out of the next World Youth Day, but maybe I'll show up in Seoul, South Korea as a chaperone :)"













Today's second reading from Romans urges us, appropriately, to "not conform yourselves to this age, but be transformed by the renewal of your minds, so that you may judge what is God's will, what is good, pleasing and perfect." Often our media seem to invoke fear of "the other" but Jesus implores us to love our neighbors as ourselves. Complacency in the face of ongoing immigrant suffering is an outrage to all people of faith. Nothing less than a full commitment to both the love of God and the love of each other will suffice in a world of inequality and injustice. Matthew's gospel further adds that "right conduct will be repaid by the Son of Man."

We need to discern whether we are conforming to systems of injustice or working to transform them and ourselves. Read "Open Wide Our Hearts", the US Conference of Bishops 2018 pastoral letter against racism in light of today's ongoing immigrant crisis. (Simply Google "Open Wide Our Hearts" and it comes up.) Their letter has deep insights into the treatment of immigrants and ongoing racist attitudes. The following excerpts bring the Bishops' words to life in these trying times:

"As Christians, we are called to listen and know the stories of our brothers and sisters. We must create opportunities to hear, with an open heart, the tragic stories that are deeply imprinted on the lives of our brothers and sisters, if we are to be moved with empathy to promote justice."

"Extreme nationalistic ideologies are feeding the American public discourse with xenophobic rhetoric that instigates fear against foreigners, immigrants and refugees."

How does Old St. Pat's advocate for and accompany "the other" and, at the same time, help counteract these misguided viewpoints? One way is through continued support for the Immigrant and Refugee Ministry (IRM). We can express our assistance financially or by active involvement with IRM. Both forms of solidarity are vital and greatly appreciated. Your support means a great deal to everyone involved. We must do all we can to counteract viewpoints that are xenophobic, racist and also unchristian. The Old St. Pat's vision statement calls us to action. We must lead "change within the Catholic Church marked by radical inclusivity, exquisite worship, and transformative kinship." And to strive to reach these goals we, who are the Church, say amen!

Call to Action: It is so important for OSP parishioners to understand that the U.S. currently requires that asylum seekers wait for UP TO A YEAR--OR FREQUENTLY LONGER--to obtain a work permit, enabling them to support themselves and their families.

There are currently two bills pending—a House bill and another in the U.S. Senate—that would reduce that waiting period to 30 days. #### Saint Gregory the Great

Saint of the Day for September 3, 2023

Gregory was the prefect of Rome before he was 30. After five years in office he resigned, founded six monasteries on his Sicilian estate, and became a Benedictine monk in his own home at Rome.

Ordained a priest, Gregory became one of the pope's seven deacons, and also served six years in the East as papal representative in Constantinople. He was recalled to become abbot, but at the age of 50 was elected pope by the clergy and people of Rome.

Gregory was direct and firm. He removed unworthy priests from office, forbade taking money for many services, emptied the papal treasury to ransom prisoners of the Lombards and to care for persecuted Jews and the victims of plague and famine. He was very concerned about the conversion of England, sending 40 monks from his own monastery. He is known for his reform of the liturgy, and for strengthening respect for doctrine. Whether he was largely responsible for the revision of "Gregorian" chant is disputed.

Gregory lived in a time of perpetual strife with invading Lombards and difficult relations with the East. When Rome itself was under attack, he interviewed the Lombard king.

His book, Pastoral Care, on the duties and qualities of a bishop, was read for centuries after his death. He described bishops mainly as physicians whose main duties were preaching and the enforcement of discipline. In his own down-to-earth preaching, Gregory was skilled at applying the daily Gospel to the needs of his listeners. Called "the Great," Gregory has been given a place with Augustine, Ambrose, and Jerome, as one of the four key doctors of the Western Church.

An Anglican historian has written: "It is impossible to conceive what would have been the confusion, the lawlessness, the chaotic state of the Middle Ages without the medieval papacy; and of the medieval papacy, the real father is Gregory the Great."


