

Synod (noun): making a way together, walking a path together syn + hodos = 'with' + 'path'



As the world-wide Church moves toward the 'Universal Phase' of the Synod this October, we continue to learn about and pray into this unique way of engaging in the life and community of the church. Pope Francis challenges the whole church the 363 delegates traveling to Rome from around the world AND all of us who will remain in our home territories - to continue to walk with and engage in 'holy listening' to voices from all areas of our church.

It is in this spirit that our community will welcome Sr. Barbara Reid, OP to share her reflections at our 11am Mass next Sunday, September 17. Sr. Barbara is a Professor of New Testament Studies and serves as President of Catholic Theological Union here in Chicago. A member of the 'Order of Preachers' (Dominicans), Sr. Barbara is a skilled teacher and preacher, and we are grateful to have her voice helping us continue our journey together.

Walking the Journey Together ... Amplifying the Voices of the Women of the Church St. Phoebe - 1st Century Deacon

- St. Phoebe was a minister of a house church at Cenchreae, Greece, a busy seaport about six miles from land-locked Corinth.
- St. Paul speaks highly of Phoebe in his Letter to the Romans 16:1-2 and calls her a deacon (diakonos in Greek).
- Paul describes Phoebe as a benefactor, leading many to assume she was a woman of wealth.
 Others have theorized that she may not have been wealthy herself but instead was a gifted fundraiser, skilled at organizing people to support the needs of the early Christian community.



- Paul had not yet been to Rome, and he entrusted
 Phoebe to deliver his Letter to the Romans. She journeyed more than 750 miles from Cenchreae to Rome, crossing the Ionian Sea on the way, to meet with the Christian community.
- The name Phoebe means "radiant." Her feast day in both the Eastern and Western Catholic Church is September 3.

As we pray with the words of St. Paul's Letter to the Romans, let us consider St. Phoebe's charisms, drawing from the text itself and from our knowledge of her historical context while also giving ourselves permission to engage the imagination and see where the Holy Spirit inspires us during our contemplative prayer.

"I commend to you Phoebe our sister, who is a deacon of the church at Cenchreae, that you may receive her in the Lord in a manner worthy of the holy ones, and help her in whatever she may need from you, for she has been a benefactor to many and to me as well." Romans 16:1-2

It's no secret that the ways in which Old St. Pat's continues to manifest and grow its mission is through YOU. The success of Old St. Pat's mission these past many years has been through the goodness, energy, and creativity of its members and partners who stepped up and said: I got an idea. Church is always about new ideas and new ways of expressing the gospel of Jesus.



Back in 2010, Jonathan and Christina Shaver, approached then-Pastor Tom Hurley with an idea that we thought was really a good one. The Shavers had been blessed with two children and like all parents, their hands were full. Parenting is always hard work and after talking with Jonathan and Christina, Fr. Tom saw just how demanding and fulfilling it could be. Having a child with special needs, only intensifies the dedication of parents. It's truly a marvel. Parents are great heroes.

Knowing how challenging it can be on a Sunday morning for families, kids and especially those with special needs, the Shavers asked about the possibility of hosting an occasional Sunday mass for families who may need something a little different and perhaps a lot simpler. Specifically, we're talking about having a liturgy designed for kids and adults with special needs. We learned a lot from Jonathan and Christina about their little guy and how they would like to share the Sunday experience with him and if it could be done with less stimuli. We supported their request.

Now, thirteen years later, many Special Friends masses under our belts, we're still grateful for that conversation and the service we can provide for families.

Update from the Shavers in August of 2023:

Special Friends Mass allowed our immediate family and extended family members the opportunity to worship together. We also got to know other families and friends whose own individual situations made the Special Friends mass a good fit for them.

I do believe it helped Evan feel part of a broader community.

Evan is now 19 and attending a young adult transition program in CT, where he is learning life skills like budgeting and being a good roommate. He works part time at Petco and the grocery store with a job coach from the program who is teaching him job skills. Special Friends Mass was a wonderful foundation for him.

ABDIRIZEK MOHAMMED OF SOMALIA NOW HAS HIS WORK PERMIT!

You may recall that Abdirizek came to the U.S. in June 2022 to escape the political and ethnic violence in Somalia. Great news--he has finally received his work permit and a social security number; he is actively seeking a job in nursing (he has a nursing degree from Somalia) and plans to take ESL classes at Truman Junior College. Abdirizek speaks English, French and Arabic in addition to his native language. His IRM family liaison, Peggy Burke, reports that he is living very simply in a small studio apartment, located in Chicago's Uptown neighborhood, and is hoping that he can send money home to support his family, who are still living in Somalia. Old St. Pat's IRM has been underwriting his rent for six months.

THE CASTILLO-RONDON FAMILY OF VENEZUELA

Lisa Cherivtch, one of the IRM family liaisons helping this young family, reported that Gabriela, the family's mom, kept shaking her head and crying, when she and her family—dad Leonardo and their two sons, Alan, 7, and Yorhan, who just turned 5—were brought to their new apartment by Lisa. They had been living in one room at the Inn of Chicago for many months, temporarily housed there by the City of Chicago and Catholic Charities.



They were so happy to move to their own 1-BR Oak Park apartment last month—the space had been set up by a team of IRM volunteers with gently used furniture from the Chicago Furniture Bank, new beds for everyone, linens, towels, pots and pans, etc.—all donated by OSP parishioners from our January household collection. The refrigerator and kitchen cabinets were also filled with familiar foods to welcome them. The family was especially grateful for the two donated window air conditioners these past few weeks. The family's two little boys have already begun 2nd grade and kindergarten at the local elementary school.

The Immigration & Refugee Ministry (IRM) is so grateful to Old St. Pat's members for their generous, ongoing support of our efforts. A sincere thanks to all--the need is great.





THE SEASON OF CREATION BEGINS: LET JUSTICE AND PEACE FLOW

The Season is Creation is a time when churches of many denominations focus on faith-based responses to the environmental crisis. The Season begins each year on September 1, the World Day of Prayer for creation, and ends on October 4, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, beloved in many faiths as the patron saint of ecology. Each year, a Steering Committee composed of representatives of several religious groups creates a theme for the Season of Creation. This year's theme, "Let Justice and Peace Flow," recognizes the vital part water plays in sustaining life in all its forms on earth, and acknowledges that the environmental crisis is also a crisis of justice, based on the unequal burden placed on some parts of the world.

Pope Francis writes movingly about these issues in his letter addressing the 2023 Season of Creation. Acknowledging the theme of this year's season, he calls for us to harmonize our own rhythms with those of creation, so that the heartbeat of Creation matches the heartbeat of God. He asks us to stand with the victims of environmental and climate justice, in opposition to predatory industries, like those involved with fracking, mega-mining projects, and intensive animal farming.

The Pope urges us to make three changes in response to the Season of Creation. First, to transform our hearts in four areas: in relation to God, other human beings, nature, and ourselves. Second, to transform our lifestyles, so we live with moderation and joyful sobriety, following practices like consistent recycling and making sustainable choices about the products and services we use. Third, to transform public policies, so we bring an end to the era of fossil fuels, and develop ways to pay back the ecological debt richer nations owe to the rest of the world.

Acting with urgency now means we will not miss our chance to create a more sustainable just world, as the United Nations has acknowledged. In doing so, we acknowledge our faith that nature is an inexhaustible gift, and our common home a great cathedral, worthy of our veneration and devotion.

Saint Thomas of Villanova

Saint of the Day for September 3, 2023

Saint Thomas was from Castile in Spain and received his surname from the town where he was raised. He received a superior education at the University of Alcala and became a popular professor of philosophy there.

After joining the Augustinian friars at Salamanca, Thomas was ordained and resumed his teaching–despite a continuing absentmindedness and poor memory. He became prior and then provincial of the friars, sending the first Augustinians to the New World. He was nominated by the emperor to the archbishopric of Granada, but refused. When the see again became vacant he was pressured to accept. The money his cathedral chapter gave him to furnish his house was given to a hospital instead. His explanation to them was that "our Lord will be better served by your money being spent on the poor in the hospital. What does a poor friar like myself want with furniture?"

He wore the same habit that he had received in the novitiate, mending it himself. The canons and domestics were ashamed of him, but they could not convince him to change. Several hundred poor came to Thomas's door each morning and received a meal, wine, and money. When criticized because he was at times being taken advantage of, he replied, "If there are people who refuse to work, that is for the governor and the police to deal with. My duty is to assist and relieve those who come to my door." He took in orphans and paid his servants for every deserted child they brought to him. He encouraged the wealthy to imitate his example and be richer in mercy and charity than they were in earthly possessions.

Criticized because he refused to be harsh or swift in correcting sinners, Thomas said, "Let him (the complainer) inquire whether Saint Augustine and Saint John Chrysostom used anathemas and excommunication to stop the drunkenness and blasphemy which were so common among the people under their care."

As he lay dying, Thomas commanded that all the money he possessed be distributed to the poor. His material goods were to be given to the rector of his college. Mass was being celebrated in his presence when after Communion he breathed his last, reciting the words: "Into your hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit."

In his lifetime Thomas of Villanova was already called "the almsgiver" and "the father of the poor." He was canonized in 1658. Thomas of Villanova's liturgical feast is celebrated on September 22.
