"Whaaat???"

This expression is so common in my household these days, it feels like I am in the middle of a viral meme. Expressed sometimes completely in earnest, sometimes with cheekiness, or sometimes with a combination of the two: this single word reaction seems to serve as a marker of this moment in our family life. My children are trying to get back into the rhythm of the school-year with its uncomfortable schedules and demands of homework, lunch-making, studying, and one of the greatest pain-points: alarm clocks. So while our kids are now old enough to have memories of the *last* school year and the responsibilities and rhythms that came with it, the expression of shock, disbelief, and disappointment is a daily (hourly) reminder that they have not yet fully bought into this system.

As a parent in this household, my response to this reaction is often yet another layer of the same thing: What?? How are you *still* surprised that you have 25 minutes of math practice on the tablet for homework every Wednesday? How are you still shocked that outside of homework, there is no screen time Monday - Thursdays after school?

But the comical truth is that in so many other areas of my life, I AM the kid/meme asking the same question with all the drama my kids regularly muster. Whaaat?? My dismay is usually aimed at the larger issues of the world or the idiosyncrasies of 'adult life.' What is with how easy technology has made it to not leave my house to obtain food or clothes or gadgets but how complicated it has made it for me to make a doctor appointment? Why is a world or society of supposed 'grownups' at one another's throats so often? But unlike my kids' 'Whaaat?', mine is admittedly tinged with a righteousness and judgment that is anything but seeking genuine understanding.

So I find myself deeply grateful for the wisdom of my colleague and teacher, Bob Kolatorowitz, who recently proposed that this moment in the church - this *synodal* moment of making a way with one another - is basically a bold invitation, an urging for all of us to *stay curious*. **Stay curious** and ask my neighbor to share more about why they see the world the way they do; Stay curious and wonder what is underneath the anger or resentment of my uncle; Stay curious and explore what is behind my own motivations, my hesitations, my wounds. Stay curious ... keep listening.

If we are really going to do it, this kind of listening is one that will take serious practice: life-long and community-wide practice. It will demand some inner work and serious spiritual freedom to remain open to tenderness, even in the midst of misunderstanding and disagreement. Listening and staying curious means trusting that the same Jesus whose paschal mystery we celebrate each Sunday together is relentlessly working at this moment in time, even through our messy, awkward, and wounded attempts at connection ... and *communion*.

Another expression common in our home right now is, *We can do hard things!** And if ever there were a moment for rallying together to do a hard thing for the healing of the world, guided by the Spirit of the living God, it might just be this one.

As was the practice at the beginning of each session of the Second Vatican Council, the 464 participants of the Synod on Synodality in Rome starting this week will open each session of learning and listening to one another with a common prayer for openness. In that same spirit, some of the liturgical leaders at Old St. Patrick's have crafted a synod prayer for us at Old St. Pat's - one which we will pray in



liturgies, in planning meetings, and in other pastoral encounters. We invite you to consider uniting your voice to others throughout the world as we pray for and with the representatives of our church communities as they enter these weeks of holy listening and encounter.

Old St. Patrick's Synod Prayer

Mighty and loving God, send your Holy Spirit among us, who gather in the name of your Son.

As we make our way together as church, speak tenderly to our hearts so that we may listen tenderly to each other.

As we make our way together as loved sinners, remind us to love one another as you loved us first.

As we make our way together in the Good Shepherd's flock, fix our attention on Jesus Christ wherever he may lead.

And as we make our way together in the power of the Spirit, let that same Spirit guide the Synod that seeks your wisdom.

Renew and transform your church,

that we may reveal your kingdom and give you glory.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Among the 194 Catholic dioceses in the United States, the Archdiocese of Chicago has the most developed domestic violence outreach program. The ACDVO Office has preached on domestic violence at Masses in 180 parishes throughout the Chicago area since 2008. ACDVO has developed local ministries serving victims of domestic violence in nearly 100 parishes.

Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Chicago, parish-based ministries, and other organizations also provide aid to victims of domestic violence.

Robert Loerzel, a freelance journalist and photographer, wrote Chicago magazine's October 2021 cover story about the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, telling the history in the words of people who lived through the disaster.

Loerzel is the author of the nonfiction book Alchemy of Bones: Chicago's Luetgert Murder Case of 1897, published in 2003 by the University of Illinois Press. In 2020, his book Walking Chicago (Second Edition) was published by Wilderness Press.

His reporting and writing have appeared in the Tribune, the Sun-Times, the Reader, Crain's Chicago Business, and Playbill. He has reported for WBEZ's Curious City — including the stories "What if the Great Chicago Fire of 1871 Never Happened?" and "Who Wrote the Song About the Cow That Started the Great Chicago Fire?"

In 2022, he co-wrote The Union Stockyards, an hour long documentary that aired on WTTW as part of the Chicago Stories series. The episode won a Chicago/Midwest Emmy Award for best historical documentary. Loerzel also co-wrote a new Chicago Stories episode, The Race to Reverse the River, premiering Sept. 29 on Channel 11.







Saint of the Day for October 1, 2023

"I prefer the monotony of obscure sacrifice to all ecstasies. To pick up a pin for love can convert a soul."

These are the words of Thérèse of Lisieux, a Carmelite nun called the "Little Flower," who lived a cloistered life of obscurity in the convent of Lisieux, France. And her preference for hidden sacrifice did indeed convert souls. Few saints of God are more popular than this young nun. Her autobiography, The Story of a Soul, is read and loved throughout the world. Thérèse Martin entered the convent at the age of 15 and died in 1897 at the age of 24.

Life in a Carmelite convent is indeed uneventful and consists mainly of prayer and hard domestic work. But Thérèse possessed that holy insight that redeems the time, however dull that time may be. She saw in quiet suffering a redemptive suffering, suffering that was indeed her apostolate. Thérèse said she came to the Carmel convent "to save souls and pray for priests." And shortly before she died, she wrote: "I want to spend my heaven doing good on earth."

Thérèse was canonized in 1925. On October 19, 1997, Pope John Paul II proclaimed her a Doctor of the Church, the third woman to be so recognized in light of her holiness and the influence of her teaching on spirituality in the Church.

Her parents, Louis and Zélie, were beatified in 2008 and canonized in 2015.

Thérèse has much to teach our age of the image, the appearance, the "self." We have become a dangerously self-conscious people, painfully aware of the need to be fulfilled, yet knowing we are not. Thérèse, like so many saints, sought to serve others, to do something outside herself, to forget herself in quiet acts of love. She is one of the great examples of the gospel paradox that we gain our life by losing it, and that the seed that falls to the ground must die in order to live.

Preoccupation with self separates modern men and women from God, from their fellow human beings, and ultimately from themselves. We must re-learn to forget ourselves, to contemplate a God who draws us out of ourselves, and to serve others as the ultimate expression of selfhood. These are the insights of Saint Thérèse, and they are more valid today than ever.




