



In addition to working at Old St. Pat's, I am a wedding planner so today's Gospel reading truly resonated with me. Jesus compares the kingdom of heaven to a wedding feast and that is beautiful because a wedding feast is a celebration of love.

Who is invited to the wedding feast? This is always a difficult question for my couples due to budget constraints, family drama, and more. But in today's parable, the king has no constraints just like God has no limits for the kingdom of heaven. All are invited to the feast, even "bad and good alike." Now, that sounds like a party! Not only are we invited, but we are also called to invite everybody to the feast.

Wedding guests are always so fascinating to me because I don't meet them until the day of the wedding. At this point I have worked with the couple for almost a year and know them well, but not their guests. And at every wedding, something very interesting happens. Each time, the guests are so much like the couple. It blows my mind every time. If the couple are sweet, their guests are all very courteous with the vendors. If the couple are funny and loud, their guests are on the dance floor the whole time. And so on. I love observing this because I see how wedding guests are a representation of the couple. It is almost as if the couple and their guests are one. Wedding feasts are truly a union of love and not just for the happy couple, but their guests as well.

So, if we all are invited guests at the wedding feast, at the kingdom of heaven, I believe that we are part of God and they are part of us. There aren't just chief priests and elders, but everyone is invited and today we ask ourselves what we are doing to continue inviting everyone and make them feel welcome?





Setting the Tone and Expectations

Pope Francis and the hosts of the Synod are trying to create both an atmosphere of transparency with the larger church and world and an atmosphere of freedom and openness within the small group discussions happening within the Synod. On October 7, Cardinal Fridolin Ambongo of Kinshasa, Congo shared the comments below to help journalists and people all over the world better understand the environment and goals of the synod. His words in the following Catholic News Service story are helpful for all of us in setting the right expectations for this synodal work.



The synod on synodality is not geared to "resolve particular problems" in the Catholic Church, such as the blessing of same-sex unions or women's ordination, but to explore ways for the church to discuss and address such issues, a cardinal said.

"There are a lot of people who believe that this synod will bring solutions to all problems," Cardinal Fridolin Ambongo of Kinshasa, Congo, said during a news conference at the Vatican Oct. 7. "But the synod will define the new way of 'doing' church, the new way of approaching problems, what the problem is but also how in the spirit of synodality we will approach that problem."

The cardinal said before he left home for the synod, many people from across Africa asked him to bring solutions back with him for the problems that affect the continent, namely poverty and conflicts. Yet "these are exaggerated expectations," he said.

Asked about the acceptance of blessings for same-sex unions in the church, Cardinal Ambongo said, "We are here for a synod on synodality."

"Synodality does not mean expressing personal opinions, but walking together," he added. "On the LGBT question, the Lord himself will show us the way through collective discernment."

The cardinal said he was confident the synod will "bear good fruits" for the whole of the church and said he was struck by the joy, trust, enthusiasm and hope present among the synod participants.

The cardinal, president of the Symposium of Episcopal Conferences of Africa and Madagascar, spoke with reporters after the fourth day of the assembly of the Synod of Bishops. Assembly participants finished conversations Oct. 6 on the first module of the synod's agenda dedicated to reflecting on the characteristics of a synodal church. The 35 working groups of 10-12 people each submitted reports summarizing their small-group conversations to the synod general secretariat Oct. 7.

Pope Francis was not present for the small-group work Oct. 7, but attended the general sessions Oct. 5-6 when the small-groups shared their initial reflections.

Cardinal Ambongo told reporters a climate of openness had been established in the synod, noting that participants initially seemed to wonder what they could or could not talk about in their discussions but that by the fourth day everyone felt free to speak about what was on their hearts and minds.

Participants, he said, quickly realized that "nobody among us came with an agenda that they try to pass, as we've seen in other synods. We are all there, brothers and sisters, listening to the will of God for his church."

"People cannot easily say, 'I know the will of God,' that would be truly pretentious," said the cardinal. "That is why the synod rightly chose the method of discerning," which he said entails seeking together "that which seems today and right now the best solution" to a given issue. He added that this synod is unlike the other three that he participated in because previously "we knew more or less how things would end, but this one, no."

October is **National Domestic Violence Awareness Month**, and as a faith community we want to share information that can help each of us better understand this important issue and the way it affects individuals and communities everywhere. Over the coming weeks, we will offer articles and opportunities to get involved in Domestic Violence prevention and support for survivors.

How Witnessing Domestic Violence Affects Children



Preschoolers who witness domestic violence, may revert to the habits of younger children: thumb sucking, bedwetting, increased crying, and whining.

School-aged children can develop anti-social traits, struggle with guilt over the abuse witnessed and take on the blame for the abuse their parent deals with. Domestic violence has ability to cause post-traumatic stress disorder in children that are raised around it.

The trauma of domestic violence is enough to cause dangerous changes in the developing brains of children, including nightmares, changes in sleep patterns, anger, irritability, difficulty concentrating.

Routinely witnessing domestic violence places children at a high risk of developing depression, sadness, concentration issues into adulthood. In some instances, children that live in abusive households are also likely to fall victim to this treatment themselves.

We are reminded daily about the humble circumstances our migrant brothers and sisters experience as busloads continue to bring them to our city. You parishioners have been amazing in your response and passion to help. There is a saying, "If you have more than you need, build a bigger table." Old St. Pat's is working to build that bigger table. But it is very chaotic. We know asylum seekers have been moved into the Parthenon Shelter on South Halsted, but the city is organizing the program there and has not yet directed OSP on how to assist. Migrants are huddled outside police stations, and we worry for them as the weather gets colder. The OSP coat drive will help, but it is sometimes overwhelming to consider how to help all. Our laws accept asylum seekers yet tell them they cannot work for 180 days.

This is the type of chaos that the King in the Gospel reading finds when inviting guests to his feast, to his table. Those who already have more than they need do not respond. Those who feel threatened by the invitation to join the bigger table do violence to silence the invitation. The humble respond and yet the Gospel reminds us to be in awe, to be dressed appropriately, as we approach the bigger table. We are called to be in awe of God's plan.

Back to the chaos...It seems like what we do is just a drop in the bucket. St. Paul reminds us, "I can do all things in him who strengthens me." So we keep building that bigger table, we are humbled by the passion given to us by God; we are in awe of the truth that God's family will celebrate together in dignity, and we keep going out to invite. Thank you OSP for your humble heart.

Saint Teresa of Avila

Saint of the Day for October 15, 2023

Teresa lived in an age of exploration as well as political, social, and religious upheaval. It was the 16th century, a time of turmoil and reform. She was born before the Protestant Reformation and died almost 20 years after the closing of the Council of Trent.

The gift of God to Teresa in and through which she became holy and left her mark on the Church and the world is threefold: She was a woman; she was a contemplative; she was an active reformer.

As a woman, Teresa stood on her own two feet, even in the man's world of her time. She was "her own woman," entering the Carmelites despite strong opposition from her father. She is a person wrapped not so much in silence as in mystery. Beautiful, talented, outgoing, adaptable, affectionate, courageous, enthusiastic, she was totally human. Like Jesus, she was a mystery of paradoxes: wise, yet practical; intelligent, yet much in tune with her experience; a mystic, yet an energetic reformer; a holy woman, a womanly woman.

Teresa was a woman "for God," a woman of prayer, discipline, and compassion. Her heart belonged to God. Her ongoing conversion was an arduous lifelong struggle, involving ongoing purification and suffering. She was misunderstood, misjudged, and opposed in her efforts at reform. Yet she struggled on, courageous and faithful; she struggled with her own mediocrity, her illness, her opposition. And in the midst of all this she clung to God in life and in prayer. Her writings on prayer and contemplation are drawn from her experience: powerful, practical, and graceful. She was a woman of prayer; a woman for God.

Teresa was a woman "for others." Though a contemplative, she spent much of her time and energy seeking to reform herself and the Carmelites, to lead them back to the full observance of the primitive Rule. She founded over a half-dozen new monasteries. She traveled, wrote, fought—always to renew, to reform. In her self, in her prayer, in her life, in her efforts to reform, in all the people she touched, she was a woman for others, a woman who inspired and gave life.

Her writings, especially the Way of Perfection and The Interior Castle, have helped generations of believers.

In 1970, the Church gave her the title she had long held in the popular mind: Doctor of the Church. She and St. Catherine of Siena were the first women so honored.

Ours is a time of turmoil, a time of reform, and a time of liberation. Modern women have in Teresa a challenging example. Promoters of renewal, promoters of prayer, all have in Teresa a woman to reckon with, one whom they can admire and imitate.
