"Synodality begins with Coffee"

Sr. Nathalie Becquart, a Xaviere sister who was named undersecretary of this Synod of Bishops, described in an interview back in 2021 that the 'theme' or focus for this years-long Synod was not simply an invention of Pope Francis' imagination. She says that back in 2018, the Synod on Young People, Faith, and Vocational Discernment



revealed that the only way the church would be able to evangelize and share the love of Christ with the young people of the world was to become a church of true synodality: a church that journeys with and listens to all of its members. The fruit of that synod on Young People, then, is the church's participation in this years-long and world-wide 'synodal conversion.'

And, Sr. Nathalie says, it all starts with coffee. She explains that synodality, at its basic level, starts with something as simple as sharing time and conversation with others - opening up our hearts and minds to hear their stories and share our own. Easy, right?

But come to think of it, most of us are fairly picky about with whom we are willing to grab coffee (or tea, or a walk). Some of us (yes, myself included) are so protective of our time and attention, we simply skip those interactions all together, opting instead to eat at our desks, and consume coffee during the commute ... all for the sake of efficiency. Or maybe, in truth, it's for the sake of vulnerability-prevention. Because deep down I know that a real coffee date with someone I don't know well means I don't know where the conversation is going, much less have any control over the encounter. It means I don't know what will be shared with me, and I'm not sure what I should share.

While I still have much further to go, it is clear to me that the Old St. Pat's community has been assisting in my own 'synodal conversion' for many years now. My fellow members and leaders push me to stay curious and open, to welcome the conversations after Mass, the listening sessions with leaders, or the phone calls offering feedback. You have taught me that some of the deepest wisdom comes from the edges of the community, the ones otherwise overlooked. You have created an environment of care that makes it possible for so many of us to, piece by piece, remove the armor of defensiveness so we can show up with and for one another.

Sr. Nathalie and the other architects of the Synod on Synodality have dedicated years of effort, trying to operationalize at the highest structural levels of the Catholic Church the kind of encounter-centered and accompaniment focused modality that communities like ours have been living (imperfectly, to be sure) through the generations. Let us pray that the Holy Spirit continues to power the conversion of our hearts and cultures so we, the whole Body of Christ, can be bearers of the light of Christ to a world in need.



October is **National Domestic Violence Awareness Month**, and as a faith community we want to share information that can help each of us better understand this important issue and the way it affects individuals and communities everywhere. Over the coming weeks, we will offer articles and opportunities to get involved in Domestic Violence prevention and support for survivors.

Let's Prevent Domestic Violence.



Intimate partner violence (IPV), also known as domestic violence, is a serious public health problem. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) found one of three women is hit or sexually assaulted by her intimate partner in her life. Astounding!!! IPV is abuse in a romantic relationship that has lasting, harmful effects. Prevention efforts should promote healthy respectful relationships.

The Archdiocese of Chicago Domestic Violence Outreach (ACDVO) launched a prevention initiative in 2021 focused on teaching middle school students about healthy, respectful, non-violent relationships.

In the past school year, ACDVO implemented the CDC's curriculum on healthy relationships, Dating Matters (DM), in six Catholic and six Chicago public schools. St. Agnes of Bohemia school was the first school to successfully complete ACDVO's DM three-year pilot. In the 2023-2024 academic year, the pilot will include eight archdiocesan and six Chicago public schools.

Now DM is about to go international. The Swedish government has decided to implement DM in all its schools. The Swedish team is eager to visit ACDVO schools in Chicago.

"...so that toward the rising and the setting of the sun people may know that there is none besides me." Is 45:5-6

This collection of readings is so interesting. They are all about standing firm in the faith that God is our creator, lover, and guide. "With much conviction" 1 Thes 1:5b) is how we must act in word and deed. And this is the conviction that Jesus uses towards the hypocrites who test him about taxes. Why do we worry about money? Money does not belong to God. Give to God what belongs to God. Our time belongs to God. Do we use our time wisely? Our life belongs to God. Does our life reflect God's love?

Yet, we are inundated with images of war in two global locations, extreme poverty and violence in countries where migrants are fleeing. It is difficult to feel conviction that God is guiding us. We hear from the refugee and asylum-seeking families supported by OSP's Immigration & Refugee Ministry (IRM) that they find safety and support here; that they think of us as one family now. This strengthens our conviction that we are doing God's work, as little as it seems to be in the grand scheme of life. We must stand firm that we can do small things in great ways!

Another small thing to do is express our conviction to those in power – our representatives. The Asylum Seeker Work Authorization Act of 2023 was introduced to Congress earlier this year and sits in committee. Read more about this act: bit.ly/AsylumSeekerWorkAct Call your representatives to ask the status of this bill and ask who you should call to move this bill out of committee and onto the floor for voting. Our Asylum-Seeking families need to be allowed to work!

GREEN NOTES FROM THE OSP GREEN TEAM TIPS FOR A SUSTAINABLE FALL AND HALLOWEEN

"In the past, we have asked one things of our gardens: that they be pretty.

Now they have to support life, sequester carbon, feed pollinators, and manage water."

Temperatures are falling on winds out of the Canada, leaves are coloring up and dropping, birds are bulking up with seeds for the flight to their wintering grounds, and bees are steadfastly gathering pollen and nectar for the cold to come; while juncos, one of our winter birds, have arrived from farther north. We have taken out our fleece, found our hats and gloves. Now it is a good time to think about sustainable ways to prepare our yards and gardens for winter, and to celebrate Halloween.

- Decaying leaves are a natural fertilizer and mulch for our lawns and garden areas, so do not rake them up.
 Instead mulch them with your mower and leave them on your grass, to provide nutrients and cut down on
 weeds for the spring. Or you can also rake them into your garden beds where they will enrich the soil and
 protect your garden plants from cold.
- No need to cut back all your dying plant stems to the ground now. Instead allow them to remain, so that birds can continue to collect seeds and any insect nests are intact. Leave this chore for the spring.
- Keep that gas powered leaf blower in the garage. This common garden tool is a big emitter of carbon monoxide, nitrous oxides, and hydrocarbons. Although four stroke leaf blowers emit fewer polluting gases than two stroke leaf blowers, two stroke leaf blowers are commonly used because of their light weight. According to tests performed in 2011, a two-stroke leaf blower emitted 23 times more carbon monoxide and 300 times more hydrocarbons than a Ford pickup truck. Gas leaf blowers are also noisy, emitting as much low frequency sound as an airplane taking off. Continued long term exposure to gas leaf blower noise is known to cause tinnitus and hearing loss. So, take out that rake to move those leaves from the sidewalk, and use your power mower to turn them into mulch that stays on your lawn or in your garden beds.
- Decorating with pumpkins is a great way to celebrate the season. Buy your pumpkins from local farmers'
 markets to support our regional farmers and reduce the carbon footprint of your pumpkin's transportation.
 When you are done with your pumpkin, compost it yourself in your own yard, or see if your town has place
 where you can take it for composting.
- Avoid using those plastic spider webs as decorations. They trap and kill birds, insects, and small mammals, and are a single use plastic. Think about making decorations from paper or wood, which are easy to recycle. String orange LED lights outside for a spooky seasonal glow.
- Send the kids out to collect Halloween treats with a bucket, a pillow case, or other reusable container, not a single use plastic bag.
- Shop for costumes at the thrift shop rather than buying something packaged and completely new. Often you can combine several thrift store finds, including hats, gloves, and jewelry, with things you already own, to come up with an imaginative new look. If you search online for thrift store Halloween costumes, you will find lots of ideas.

Small steps, you are thinking. Yes, true, small steps. But one small step after another, we can get to a more sustainable world, a world where preserve the rich biodiversity of this planet, and we see all Earth's creatures as our brothers and sisters, and worthy of our care and concern.



Saint John Paul II

Saint of the Day for October 22, 2023

"Open wide the doors to Christ," urged John Paul II during the homily at the Mass where he was installed as pope in 1978.

Born in Wadowice, Poland, Karol Jozef Wojtyla had lost his mother, father, and older brother before his 21st birthday. Karol's promising academic career at Krakow's Jagiellonian University was cut short by the outbreak of World War II. While working in a quarry and a chemical factory, he enrolled in an "underground" seminary in Kraków. Ordained in 1946, he was immediately sent to Rome where he earned a doctorate in theology. Back in Poland, a short assignment as assistant pastor in a rural parish preceded his very fruitful chaplaincy for university students. Soon Fr. Wojtyla earned a doctorate in philosophy and began teaching that subject at Poland's University of Lublin Communist officials allowed Wojtyla to be appointed auxiliary bishop of Kraków in 1958, considering him a relatively harmless intellectual. They could not have been more wrong! Bishop Wojtyla attended all four sessions of Vatican II and contributed especially to its Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World. Appointed as archbishop of Kraków in 1964, he was named a cardinal three years later. Elected pope in October 1978, he took the name of his short-lived, immediate predecessor. Pope John Paul II was the first non-Italian pope in 455 years. In time, he made pastoral visits to 124 countries, including several with small Christian populations. John Paul II promoted ecumenical and interfaith initiatives, especially the 1986 Day of Prayer for World Peace in Assisi. He visited Rome's main synagogue and the Western Wall in Jerusalem; he also established diplomatic relations between the Holy See and Israel. He improved Catholic-Muslim relations, and in 2001 visited a mosque in Damascus, Syria. The Great Jubilee of the Year 2000, a key event in John Paul's ministry, was marked by special celebrations in Rome and elsewhere for Catholics and other Christians. Relations with the Orthodox Churches improved considerably during his papacy.

"Christ is the center of the universe and of human history" was the opening line of John Paul II's 1979 encyclical, Redeemer of the Human Race. In 1995, he described himself to the United Nations General Assembly as "a witness to hope." His 1979 visit to Poland encouraged the growth of the Solidarity movement there and the collapse of communism in central and eastern Europe 10 years later. John Paul II began World Youth Day and traveled to several countries for those celebrations. He very much wanted to visit China and the Soviet Union, but the governments in those countries prevented that. One of the most well-remembered photos of John Paul II's pontificate was his one-on-one conversation in 1983, with Mehmet Ali Agca. who had attempted to assassinate him two years earlier. In his 27 years of papal ministry, John Paul II wrote 14 encyclicals and five books, canonized 482 saints and beatified 1,338 people. In the last years of his life, he suffered from Parkinson's disease and was forced to cut back on some of his activities. Pope Benedict XVI beatified John Paul II in 2011, and Pope Francis canonized him in 2014.

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
