#### Slow Down (to) Listen Up

Last week, Dr. John Igwebuike from St. Ignatius College Prep and founder of the <u>Lead Listening Institute</u> came to Old St. Pat's as part of our At the Crossroads Speaker and Discussion Series. As both a Catholic who is curious about how this whole "synodal listening" might lead to life-giving transformation in our church and as someone who knows she has has become significantly




more extroverted over the years, I knew I had to be there as Dr. Igwebuike talked ... about listening. And wow was it (and was he) good. Far from one of those talks that is intellectually interesting, but hard to operationalize ... that presentation and those present for discussion were my teachers reminding me not about lofty concepts, but deeply human realities.

Because it is clear that our world values (and incentivizes) speed. Get things done quickly, learn quickly, respond quickly. In my 16+ years at Old St. Pat's, I have come to feel proud of how quickly our community has responded to certain challenges, designed (and redesigned) efforts to support the changing needs of families, refugees, asylum seekers, elders, teens and more. I have even witnessed my colleagues and volunteers having to pivot an entire 1000-person celebration from one location to another in the span of an hour, refusing to let it dampen the joy of the moment and inviting even more people to contribute to its success. Moving from event to event and program to program, the rhythm of our community can resemble the Irish step dancing of some of our immigrant founding members. I find joy and, oddly, peace in that near-constant movement.

But this same community, in its wisdom, has also recognized when it is essential to slow down, take a breath, and make space for the quiet. The liturgical year aids in creating these spaces at Advent and Lent (except for the shamrock-filled days of March, of course). Additionally, though, we always seem to have members of this community who courageously lift their voices, like the prophets, reminding us to stop and really look and listen to what is happening. Authentic discernment and holy listening cannot be done while moving at the speed of trends on social media. And real, human, relational, and tender listening cannot happen without first slowing down.

"Love does not consist in gazing at one another, but in looking outward together in the same direction" says the poet Antoine de Saint-Exupéry. I think that might be another way of pointing to the heart of the synodal movement. The people who love Jesus slow down, and together look outward in the same direction. And as they do, the Spirit rises up and can be heard: in the story of a woman who has spent her life ministering to the LGBTQ community, in the bishop whose



Thanks be to God for this moment in our church - and this reminder for ourselves - to slow down, listen up, and to walk together.

A "Letter to the People of God" was composed by the synod participants and shared with the global church late this week. Next week, Old St. Pat's will share some insights and notes that might be helpful as the church moves into this next phase of the Synod, which will formally conclude in October 2024.



#### Be an Advocate for Victims of Domestic Violence.



#### True change happens when everyday people contribute to large movements.

You don't have to be famous, on TV, or have a huge online following to make a difference. It starts with the small step of believing the stories of survivors, and then committing to learn more about the problems facing those survivors and their children.

Everyday you can be an advocate just by chatting with others at school, work, church, wherever. Let others know you care about domestic violence. Wear purple during Domestic Violence Awareness month in October. When you're asked what it's about, explain why you are concerned about domestic violence.

If someone says, "Well, why don't they just leave," respond with, "Why are the abuser's actions allowed to go unpunished?" Misunderstandings about domestic violence are perpetuated because people simply accept them as the truth. Start a conversation that might lead to a changed mind.

You can let lawmakers know that protecting domestic violence survivors through strong and safe policy is important to you. When Archdiocese of Chicago Domestic Violence Outreach (ACDVO) sends you a call to action on pending legislation, you can reach out to your legislator.

## GREEN NOTES FROM THE OSP GREEN TEAM TIPS FOR A SUSTAINABLE FALL AND HALLOWEEN

"In the past, we have asked one things of our gardens: that they be pretty.

Now they have to support life, sequester carbon, feed pollinators, and manage water."

Temperatures are falling on winds out of the Canada, leaves are coloring up and dropping, birds are bulking up with seeds for the flight to their wintering grounds, and bees are steadfastly gathering pollen and nectar for the cold to come; while juncos, one of our winter birds, have arrived from farther north. We have taken out our fleece, found our hats and gloves. Now it is a good time to think about sustainable ways to prepare our yards and gardens for winter, and to celebrate Halloween.

- Decaying leaves are a natural fertilizer and mulch for our lawns and garden areas, so do not rake them up.
  Instead mulch them with your mower and leave them on your grass, to provide nutrients and cut down on
  weeds for the spring. Or you can also rake them into your garden beds where they will enrich the soil and
  protect your garden plants from cold.
- No need to cut back all your dying plant stems to the ground now. Instead allow them to remain, so that birds can continue to collect seeds and any insect nests are intact. Leave this chore for the spring.
- Keep that gas powered leaf blower in the garage. This common garden tool is a big emitter of carbon monoxide, nitrous oxides, and hydrocarbons. Although four stroke leaf blowers emit fewer polluting gases than two stroke leaf blowers, two stroke leaf blowers are commonly used because of their light weight. According to tests performed in 2011, a two-stroke leaf blower emitted 23 times more carbon monoxide and 300 times more hydrocarbons than a Ford pickup truck. Gas leaf blowers are also noisy, emitting as much low frequency sound as an airplane taking off. Continued long term exposure to gas leaf blower noise is known to cause tinnitus and hearing loss. So, take out that rake to move those leaves from the sidewalk, and use your power mower to turn them into mulch that stays on your lawn or in your garden beds.
- Decorating with pumpkins is a great way to celebrate the season. Buy your pumpkins from local farmers'
  markets to support our regional farmers and reduce the carbon footprint of your pumpkin's transportation.
  When you are done with your pumpkin, compost it yourself in your own yard, or see if your town has place
  where you can take it for composting.
- Avoid using those plastic spider webs as decorations. They trap and kill birds, insects, and small mammals, and
  are a single use plastic. Think about making decorations from paper or wood, which are easy to recycle. String
  orange LED lights outside for a spooky seasonal glow.
- Send the kids out to collect Halloween treats with a bucket, a pillow case, or other reusable container, not a single use plastic bag.
- Shop for costumes at the thrift shop rather than buying something packaged and completely new. Often you can combine several thrift store finds, including hats, gloves, and jewelry, with things you already own, to come up with an imaginative new look. If you search online for thrift store Halloween costumes, you will find lots of ideas.

Small steps, you are thinking. Yes, true, small steps. But one small step after another, we can get to a more sustainable world, a world where preserve the rich biodiversity of this planet, and we see all Earth's creatures as our brothers and sisters, and worthy of our care and concern.

There is no better place in Chicago to celebrate St. Brigid's Day than at Old St. Patrick's Church. Thomas A. O'Shaughnessy was the artist who transformed Old St. Patrick's Church into a shrine of ancient Irish art in the early 1900s. St. Bridget's Church in Chicago, which has closed, began as a mission from OSP in 1850. Given St. Brigid's reputation as an inclusive leader who "ministered to those whom others will not," there is also no better time in our Church than now to celebrate a woman of faith who overcame many obstacles to lead her people with compassion and vision.

This Zoom meeting will include a brief virtual tour by Eileen of the statue and three windows in Old St. Pat's dedicated to St. Brigid. Participants will then be invited to join breakout groups and share a brief story of a person who is a "Brigid" in their life. Following the storytelling, participants will be asked to reflect on common themes that surfaced. Back in the large group, they will be invited to share ideas for incorporating those themes into OSP's St. Brigid's Day celebration.



#### Saint Narcissus of Jerusalem

Saint of the Day for October 29, 2023

Life in second- and third-century Jerusalem couldn't have been easy, but Saint Narcissus managed to live well beyond 100. Some even speculate he lived to 160.

Details of his life are sketchy, but there are many reports of his miracles. The miracle for which Narcissus is most remembered was turning water into oil for use in the church lamps on Holy Saturday when the deacons had forgotten to provide any.

We do know that Narcissus became bishop of Jerusalem in the late second century. He was known for his holiness, but there are hints that many people found him harsh and rigid in his efforts to impose Church discipline. One of his many detractors accused Narcissus of a serious crime at one point. Though the charges against him did not hold up, he used the occasion to retire from his role as bishop and live in solitude. His disappearance was so sudden and convincing that many people assumed he had actually died.

Several successors were appointed during his years in isolation. Finally, Narcissus reappeared in Jerusalem and was persuaded to resume his duties. By then he had reached an advanced age, so a younger bishop was brought in to assist him until his death.

As our life spans increase and we face the bodily problems of aging, we might keep Saint Narcissus in mind and ask him to help us face our developing issues.
