





GREEN NOTES FROM OSP GREEN TEAM: Try These Tips to Eat More Plant-Based Food

You know the importance of eating more plant-based food. You understand that eating plant-based is good for your health, and good for the planet. But you want food that is delicious as well as nutritious. And you can only eat so much salad every day. What to do? Our friends at Meatless Mondays recently offered some tips for incorporating more plant-based eating into everyday meals. Here are a few of their suggestions.

- Subscribe to Meatless Mondays for a weekly email with recipe suggestions, tips, articles, and equipment and industry updates.
- Always have avocadoes on hand; use to make avocado toast, in a sandwich instead of cheese, in a smoothie, or a creamy dessert like chocolate avocado pudding.
- Buy legumes in bulk, like red or green lentils, yellow or green split peas, black beans, kidney beans, garbanzo beans, cannellini beans or pigeon peas. Lentils, peas, and beans are all inexpensive protein sources that keep for months in your pantry, and can be used in soups, stews, salads, and even deserts. Black bean brownies anyone?
- Cook with whole grains like brown and wild rice, farro, bulgur, whole wheat, and quinoa.
 Whole grains contain all the parts of the grain kernel: the fiber dense bran, the nutrient rich germ, and the starchy endosperm. Because of this, whole grains pack a rich nutrient punch.
- Tofu is another excellent plant-based protein source that can take on many different flavors. Learn how to press tofu to reduce the water content; then cook with tangy marinades or sauces.
- Experiment with substituting plant-based ground beef and sausages in recipes that call for meat. Most people find it heard to tell the difference between these products and ones made from beef or pork.
- Explore the world's ethnic cooking styles, which typically emphasis plant rather than animal ingredients. Mediterranean, Middle Eastern, Chinese, Indian, Thai, or Japanese cookbooks all provide inspiration for new dishes that focus on vegetables and whole grains as the main ingredients.
- Use bean or vegetable pastas like chickpea rotini, lentil penne or spinach fettucine instead of wheat noodles.
- Swap out a plant-based milk for dairy milk. Nut milks, oat milks and soy milks all have similar
 nutritional value to diary milk. Try in your coffee, tea, and cereal, and in baked goods. Coconut milk
 provides an elegant creamy finish to soups and stews, especially Thai and Indian dishes.
- Keep a well-stocked spice rack to pack extra flavor into dishes without adding calories or more dishes to wash.
- Invest in kitchen gadgets: a tofu press, an immersion blender, a juicer, a spiralizer, a mandolin can all make meal preparation simpler and faster, while adding texture and visual appeal to plant-based meals.
- Install an app like Happy Cow, Fork Over Knives, Vanilla Bean, or Food Monster for quick access to plant-based recipe inspiration.

FROM PRISON TO PRODUCTIVITY:

Jacqui's Inspiring Journey

Jaqui Hunter's evolving success story is a testimony to the transformative power of partnerships between Old St. Pat's (OSP) and organizations in surrounding communities. Jaqui set out on a path from gun violence to prison, to reentry from prison, to becoming an entrepreneur and eventually establishing his own catering business. He is an inspiration.



Jaqui enrolled in workforce development programming with the North Lawndale Employment Network (NLEN) at 1111 S. Homan Avenue. Founded in 1999, NLEN provides cognitive behavioral therapy, job readiness training and one-on-one coaching for job seekers so they can find and maintain living wage jobs. NLEN set Jaqui up with a coach, helped him hone his culinary skills, positioned him to earn a food handler's permit, trained him to round up customers and prepared him to run a productive business.

The North Lawndale Works Campaign which launched at OSP in July of 2023 set a goal of raising \$36,000 to assist North Lawndale area job seekers, like Jaqui. However the campaign not only reached, but it also exceeded the desired goal. In the end, OSP members contributed \$50,000, all of which is earmarked for NLEN clients who face

significant barriers to employment. Women and men who might otherwise be restricted from gainful employment because they lack: transportation, childcare, work attire, mobile phones, funds for training or licensing, one time utility bill, medical or emergency assistance, or other necessary costs now receive help paying expenses those who are more affluent could possibly take for granted. For Jaqui and others like him, these financial barriers are the difference between despair and hope at best, and sometimes even life and death.

Jaqui is making a mark in the U.S. economy, supporting himself and his family and living with dignity. It is through the missions of NLEN and OSP that Jaqui, other North Lawndale residents and people in other communities gain opportunities, access and hope they so richly deserve. Old St. Pat's, thank you for your care and the many forms of support you provide. Year in and year out, you make a positive difference.

Saint Joseph of LeonissaSaint of the Day for February 4, 2024

Joseph was born at Leonissa in the Kingdom of Naples. As a boy and as a student in early adulthood, Joseph drew attention for his energy and virtue. Offered a nobleman's daughter in marriage, Joseph refused and joined the Capuchins in his hometown in 1573 instead. Avoiding the safe compromises by which people sometimes undercut the gospel, Joseph denied himself hearty meals and comfortable quarters as he prepared for ordination and a life of preaching.

In 1587, he went to Constantinople to take care of the Christian galley slaves working under Turkish masters. Imprisoned for this work, he was warned not to resume it on his release. He did and was again imprisoned and then condemned to death. Miraculously freed, he returned to Italy where he preached to the poor and reconciled feuding families as well as warring cities which had been at odds for years. He was canonized in 1745.

Saints often jar us because they challenge our ideas about what we need for "the good life." "I'll be happy when...," we may say, wasting an incredible amount of time on the periphery of life. People like Joseph of Leonissa challenge us to face life courageously and get to the heart of it: life with God. Joseph was a compelling preacher because his life was as convincing as his words.
