

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life."

In today's Gospel Nicodemus, a Pharisee and a rabbi, who comes to Jesus under cover of darkness. Maybe Nicodemus comes to Jesus at night to keep his conversation a secret from the other Pharisees. Or maybe he was only trying to speak with Jesus when he had a better chance to spend some significant time in conversation, after the crowds have left for the day. Whatever motivation caused Nicodemus to wait until darkness had fallen, his appearance at night is unusual enough that later, when Nicodemus re-enters the story, he is referred to as "the one who came to Jesus at night." It's pretty clear that Nicodemus comes to Jesus in a state of confusion and spiritual blindness, and he can't seem to grasp what Jesus is trying to teach him.

This year I am thinking a lot about spiritual blindness. The truth is sometimes my faith is strong and sometimes I struggle to believe. Sometimes I seek the light and other times I want the darkness. Sometimes I do the truth and other times I am afraid of the truth. And I wonder if that's true for you too. I wonder if it's both at the same time in your life too.

At times I want to deny or turn away from the contradictions in my life. Especially if they are not easy to look at. They remind me what really matters and is most important to me, and the ways I've forgotten that I am loved by God. Contradictions let me know how I've gotten off track. They ask changes of me which are sometimes difficult. They reveal my wounds, fears, and limitations. My Spiritual blindness reminds me that sometimes I settle for easy solutions for which my faith calls me to more.

Nicodemus through faith was clearly changed by his conversation with Jesus. He appears twice more in John's Gospel, and each time shows how his faith has changed him. When the Pharisees were seeking to have Jesus arrested, Nicodemus went against them, defending Jesus. And when Jesus died, it was Nicodemus, joining with Joseph of Arimathea, who bravely claimed Jesus' body and prepared it for burial. For Nicodemus, believing that God so loved the world that He gave His only Son changed everything. His faith became a verb. And for us, it does the same.

God is demanding. He desires a radical and vibrant presence in our world, with you and me, as conspirators. We are loved, called and often facing a certain amount of trepidation before we say "yes" to living up to and enjoying the true essence of our being. Because living abundantly is not just what God wants for us, it's what God asks of us: "I gave you life so that you would live in abundance." If you want to understand the truth of your life – think about to whom or to what you have command your Spirit. Think about what's the center of your attention. Abundance manifests in moments that require us to trust. Trust that once, where there was fear, there shall be peace. Full reliance on God as the source of inspiration and the author of all life. Full reliance. Abundance manifests itself in risking intimacy – even when we are forced to hold tensions we don't understand. It manifests in moments that require us to trust – trust that once, where there was doubt, there shall be faith. Abundance manifests in moments that require us to trust - trust like Nicodemus that once, where there was darkness, there shall be light.



A TALE OF TWO CITIES: CHICAGO AND EL PASO By Maureen Hellwig

There are two stories (among so many more) that the Immigrant and Refugee Ministry (IRM) would like the people of Old St Pat's to know about and pray about this week.





First of all, we are pleased to welcome our fifth Venezuelan family, referred to us by Catholic Charities. This is the Jimenez family of three – Yahir, Anyla, and their daughter. An apartment has been found for them in Pilsen, and the IRM apartment set-up crew was there on March 1 to prepare the space with household goods that were donated by so many of you at the IRM "Valentine Shower" on February 11.

And, as always, furniture was selected for them from the Chicago Furniture Bank by our "queen of all furniture shopping," Penny Davoren, assisted by Peggy Burke. More will be shared about this family as IRM members get to know them better.

Our second story pertains to a sad situation at the border, in El Paso, Texas. El Paso is the home of Annunciation House, founded by Ruben Garcia and some of his friends and colleagues in 1978. For more than 45 years, Annunciation House (https://annunciationhouse.org) provided temporary shelter and respite to those crossing the border, whether with refugee status or as asylum seekers. When Garcia shares the story of how he began his lifelong work, he underscores his realization that "God identifies first and foremost with the poor and the marginalized."

At this point, Annunciation House finds itself under attack. Texas Attorney General, Ken Paxton, has filed a lawsuit, accusing Annunciation House of being involved in human trafficking. As Pauline Hovey reported in her article in The National Catholic Reporter, February 28, 2024, by the summer of 2014, the nature of migration had changed from mostly single Mexican men seeking work, to entire families arriving from Central America. And again, Ruben Garcia was at the helm, creating a network of temporary shelters to house these families. They got the opportunity for a hot shower, a change of clothes, and a phone call to relatives to help them complete their journey to be with family.

By 2016, following her husband's death, Pauline left Virginia and relocated on the southern border to become part of the work of Annunciation House and other organizations as they worked with the ebb and flow of migration. While some believe it peaked, worldwide, in 2018, there seems to be little sign of migration numbers receding. Meanwhile, Pauline said she witnessed Border Patrol and ICE agents not only admire the structure of the shelter network that Annunciation House initiated, but even bring them donations. She concluded her NCR article saying, "Those who serve immigrants and refugees . . .anyone endeavoring to follow Christ, should and must take this lawsuit as a wake-up call."

"Celtic Imagination and Sacred Art" With special guest John David Mooney

John David Mooney is an internationally-recognized sculptor and environmental artist who has executed public sculptures and temporary sculptural works all over the world. Known for his ambitious large scale pieces, Mooney's work has transformed iconic public buildings, lit up skylines and redesigned public spaces. Mooney has consistently taken a multi-disciplinary approach to art, incorporating architecture, urban planning, and history into his work. As an artist, he has also made light his signature, using unconventional light sources as bold sculptural elements.

John David served as the Artist for the renovations of Old Saint Patrick's and the restoration of Thomas O'Shaughnessy's holistic Design scheme along with the Architect of the project, Larry Booth.

He is the Founder and Artistic Director of the John David Mooney Foundation, a not-for-profit educational organization that presents international artists and architects to Chicago. It's Advanced Interdisciplinary Study Center prepares post-graduates with the necessary tools to fulfill their responsibility to society. The JDM Foundation's Ukrainian Art Bridge Fellowship program brings "at risk" Ukrainian artists and their families to Chicago and supports them with a residency and studios, as well as showcasing their work in the Foundation's International Currents Gallery. Since Russia's atrocious aggression, the John David Mooney Foundation has hosted twelve displaced Ukrainians, whose lives have been threatened and work disrupted. The next Ukrainian artist, a sculptor, is scheduled to arrive this March.








NORTHSIDE BOOK CLUB (Formerly Encounter Book Club)

Saint Dominic Savio

Saint of the Day for March 10, 2024

So many holy persons seem to die young. Among them was Dominic Savio, the patron of choirbovs.

Born into a peasant family at Riva, Italy, young Dominic joined Saint John Bosco as a student at the Oratory in Turin at the age of 12. He impressed Don Bosco with his desire to be a priest and to help him in his work with neglected boys. A peacemaker and an organizer, young Dominic founded a group he called the Company of the Immaculate Conception which, besides being devotional, aided John Bosco with the boys and with manual work. All the members save one, Dominic, would, in 1859, join Don Bosco in the beginnings of his Salesian congregation. By that time, Dominic had been called home to heaven.

As a youth, Dominic spent hours rapt in prayer. His raptures he called "my distractions." Even in play, he said that at times, "It seems heaven is opening just above me. I am afraid I may say or do something that will make the other boys laugh." Dominic would say, "I can't do big things. But I want all I do, even the smallest thing, to be for the greater glory of God."

Dominic's health, always frail, led to lung problems and he was sent home to recuperate. As was the custom of the day, he was bled in the thought that this would help, but it only worsened his condition. He died on March 9, 1857, after receiving the Last Sacraments. Saint John Bosco himself wrote the account of his life.

Some thought that Dominic was too young to be considered a saint. Saint Pius X declared that just the opposite was true, and went ahead with his cause. Dominic was canonized in 1954. His liturgical feast is celebrated on March 9.

Like many a youngster, Dominic was painfully aware that he was different from his peers. He tried to keep his piety from his friends lest he have to endure their laughter. Even after his death, his youth marked him as a misfit among the saints and some argued that he was too young to be canonized. Pope Pius X wisely disagreed. For no one is too young—or too old or too anything else—to achieve the holiness to which we all are called.

Saint Dominic Savio is the Patron Saint of Choirboys and Juvenile delinquents.

Sunday Parking:



Weeknight Parking:
